

penalty prescribed is imprisonment for not more than three years, and a fine not more than three times the value. After a short argument by counsel they were committed to await the action of the grand jury.

A modification of the order in relation to the issue of gold certificates will be made by the Secretary of the Treasury in a short time. It is found impracticable to issue all these certificates from the sub-Treasury in New York, as the Treasurer cannot sign them rapidly enough to meet the demand, therefore an order will be given for the issue of these certificates from the Treasurer's office here and other sub-Treasurers. The Assistant Treasurers of the United States will be directed to refuse silver certificates for the deposit of gold coin as gold. Gold certificates will do away with the necessity for this exchange.

The amount of gold certificates sent to New York to-day for the signatures of the Assistant Treasurer, was \$80,680,000, making a total sent to date of \$125,520,000.

Indian Commissioner Price said to-night that he knew nothing whatever of the truth or falsity of the published statements reflecting on the conduct of Agent Tiffany, at San Carlos, Arizona Agency. Tiffany's record he said was not a good one, and he would not be surprised if what is reported of him be true. Tiffany resigned his agency several weeks ago, and his resignation was received at the department just about the time it had been decided to dismiss him.

RALEIGH, N. C., 9.—The feeling against the Mormons now working in different parts of the State and South Carolina is pally increasing in bitterness and the probabilities are that if the earnest request of the people of the afflicted counties be not soon complied with violence bloodshed will be the result. A protest is now being freely circulated among the people of York County, S. C., and Cleveland County in this State, denouncing the missionaries from Utah for making disturbances among them, and expressing a determination to protect society and morals at all hazards. The history of Mormonism is briefly told in the protest and the people who have been influenced by Mormon missionaries are called upon to turn back before ruining themselves and their families.

The protest ends as follows: We, the people of York County, S. C., and Cleveland County, N. C., earnestly call upon these emissaries styling themselves Elders of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to depart in peace before the indignation of our people becomes uncontrollable and they do them bodily harm.

New York, 9.—The Hamburg-American Line steamer *Herder*, Captain Tischbein commanding, left New York, Thursday the 5th, for Hamburg, via Plymouth and Cherbourg, with 39 cabin and 94 steerage passengers and a crew of about 100. This noon the following intelligence was received by the agents here: "St. Johns, N. F. The *Herder* was lost three miles west of Cape Race. The mails and passengers and crew were saved. Signed, Purser." Up to 2 o'clock no further particulars were received by the agents. Among the passengers of the *Herder* was Miss Lumena Dieterman, of Denver; Anton Schnidelhaze, of Denver; Louis A. Hobers, of Hopland, Cal.; Dr. Henry Wagner, of San Francisco.

The agents of the Hamburg-American Company are confident that all the passengers will be well cared for.

St. Johns, N. B., 9.—The *Herder* went ashore at the eastward head of Long Beach, about three miles west of Cape Race, at 2 o'clock this morning during a dense fog. All of the passengers and crew landed without accident, and they were brought here by special steamer and cared for by the German consul. It is believed the ship and cargo will be a total loss.

On opening the lines of the Central and South American Telegraph Company, congratulatory messages were exchanged between President Arthur and the Presidents of Chili, Peru, Bolivia, Ecuador, the United States of Colombia, Costa Rica, Honduras, Nicaragua, Guatemala and Mexico. The cables of the Mexican Telegraph Company starting from Galveston, Texas, reach Vera Cruz via Tampico, at which point the Central and South American Telegraph Company extend to the Isthmus of Tehuantepec, thence by land line to the Pacific, thence by cables to Lima, in Peru, where they connect with the cables of the West

Telegraph Company, now laid to Valparaiso, Chili. These lines comprise 5,610 miles of submarine cable and 567 miles of land line, and connect exclusively with 20,000 miles of wire in Mexico and Central and South America. These lines being in communication with the United States and Europe a population of 35,000,000 is transacting an annual commerce of over \$60,000.

CHICAGO, 10.—Through the negligence of an inspector who failed to vaccinate persons in the vicinity of 254 East North Avenue, where a sporadic case of smallpox recently appeared, the disease has broken out in seven adjacent houses. Wholesale vaccination is now progressing in that section, and no fears of a further spread are entertained.

A Casselton, Dak., special says: It has been raining 12 days. No thrashing has been done during that time. A fourth of the wheat and three-fourths of the oat crop is in stack or shock here yet. The wheat in shock is badly grown and will hardly pay for thrashing. This will reduce average heavily. No other portion of Dakota reports rain or damage of any consequence.

A Lincoln, Neb., special says: The recent rains have been a bonanza to Nebraska stock-raisers. The new grass fattens cattle better than corn feeding would. Grass on the prairies has grown three inches in the past ten days. A much larger quantity of hay is in stack than ever before.

CINCINNATI, 10.—The weather is pleasant and the election is progressing quietly. The vote already in shows there will be a very large vote. So much scratching is done that the count of votes which begins after 6 p.m., will be very tedious.

CHICAGO, 10.—The *Inter-Ocean's* Wapaca, Wisconsin special says: A daring murder and bank robbery occurred here last night. The victim is H. C. Mead, a wealthy banker in business here thirty years. He was an eccentric bachelor of sixty, and he slept in the bank and boarded at a hotel. This morning he failed to appear at breakfast, and at dinner time a messenger was sent to the bank and found it locked. Going back, a window was discovered with the screen cut and the window let down from the top and Mead was lying in a pool of blood on the floor. An investigation showed his head

and face horribly mangled with a shot as if both barrels of a double-barreled shot gun had been discharged at him from short range. It is supposed that the assassins shot at him from the window while he was sitting at table writing. The safe had not been locked and the assassins carried off several thousand dollars in currency, gold and bonds. The exact amount is not known, and there is no clue to the murderers. The coroner's jury rendered a verdict in accordance with the above facts. Mead was worth considerably over \$500,000. His bank was a small, one-story, wooden structure, with a sleeping apartment in the rear room, without bars and easy of access. He was warned of his danger many times, but he always said that if his money was wanted it could be had without killing him. He resided alone in the bank nearly twenty-five years. All of his face from the cheek bone upward was shot away, and the flesh and bones scattered on the floor. Several people in the neighborhood heard the shot about midnight, but the occurrence being not unusual, excited no comment. The leading citizens have undertaken a thorough investigation, and a large reward will be offered for the murderer's arrest.

CINCINNATI, 10.—At a conference to-night between the proprietors of the rolling mills in Cincinnati and vicinity and a committee of workmen, with Jno. Jarrett at its head it was agreed to resume work at the old rates until the committee appointed for the purpose could reach an agreement as to the meaning of the adjusting made when the long strike was ended.

Edward Muther was arrested by Marshal Leftar, of Lockland, this morning, at Middletown, as the murderer of Arthur W. Ross. He had been drunk at a saloon in Lockland, where he displayed some money and wanted a check for \$50 cashed. It was thought the check had been taken from Ross' pocket-book. Muther was found at the residence of his brother-in-law, but nothing was found about him to aid in fastening suspicion on him. He was taken to Glendale.

PENSACOLA, 10.—The yellow fever increases, and the insufficiency of funds makes the situation alarming. All classes and denominations have asked for contributions.

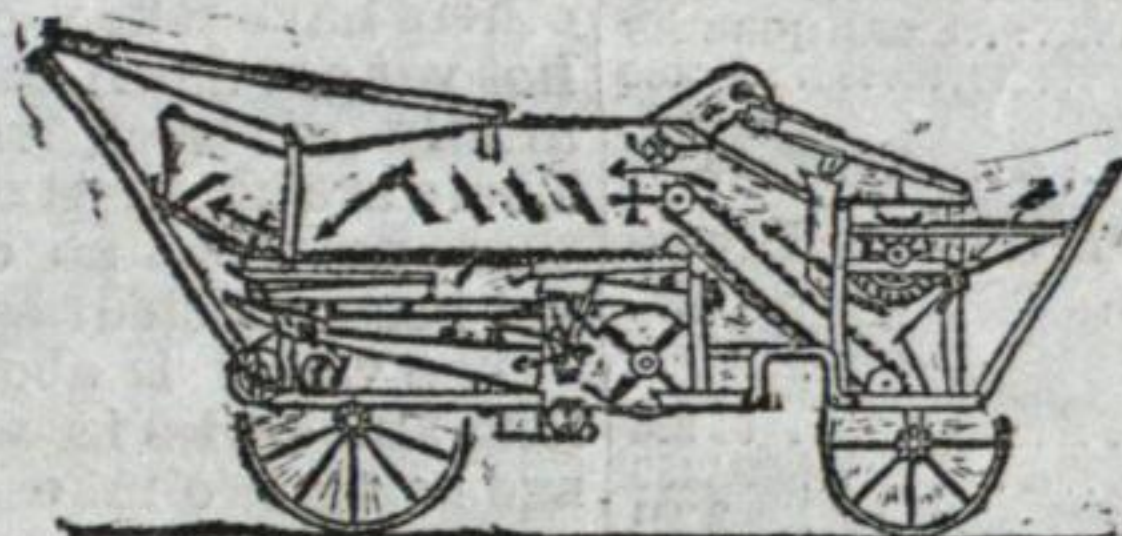
