

Indian Territory Conference.

During the past summer the Elders and their friends have erected a meeting house, the first that has been built in this Territory by the Latter-day Saints. On Saturday and Sunday October 11th and 12th, the first conference of this mission was held. The presence of Elder present were President Elder H. M. Rowlin, M. L. Nichols, F. H. Woodruff, H. G. L. Nelson, F. H. Woodruff, R. M. Harper, J. H. Matney, Hyram M. Lewis, Jos. H. Low and John A. Lowe, the last five having just arrived in the morning. There were also several G. M. members, and a large number of Saints and friends. The Elders from Salt Lake were expected to reach here on the 14th, but owing to the heavy snow storm in Colorado, which delayed the train, they were delayed one day.

At the first meeting of the conference Elder Woodruff addressed the meeting upon the first principles of the Gospel, followed by Elder Rowlin, who gave a report of the city, and also the privilege of attending. He exhorted the Saints to be faithful.

Conference was resumed at seven P. M., and Elders Abraham, Harper, Matney, John A. Lowe and M. L. Nichols spoke on the subject of the Gospel, and bore strong testimonies to its truth.

Monday morning was the time set apart for dedicating the meeting house. After the opening exercises Elder Rowlin offered the dedicatory prayer. A communication from Elder A. W. Kimball, President of the Mission, was then read. It contained much encouragement and instruction to the Elders in regard to their labors in the territory. The Elders were instructed to use wisdom, take proper care of their bodies, and to be diligent in all their labors. After the reading of the epistle Elder Nichols addressed the conference on the necessity of complying with the laws of the land.

At 2 P. M. another meeting was held and the sacrament administered, after which Elder Nichols explained the purpose for which the sacrament had been instituted. Elder Rowlin occupied the remainder of the time.

At the second meeting, held on Monday, the 17th, reports were given by the Elders from the different parts of the field, after which the new Elders were assigned to their various fields of labor.

Elder H. M. Rowlin is presiding Elder over the mission. F. H. Woodruff is president. Elder M. L. Nichols is assistant secretary and treasurer, and Elder A. W. Kimball is assistant secretary.

At 7 P. M. an interesting entertainment was given by the Elders, consisting of songs, recitations and instrumental music. Although a great many people attended our conference, the entertainment drew in many more. Advantage was taken of the opportunity to present the Gospel to them. During the evening Elder H. M. Rowlin delivered a discourse on the principles of the Gospel to about 100 persons, including those who remained on the outside, being unable to get into the building.

This report, while incomplete, without mentioning of the kindness and hospitality of our true friends and neighbors, and the many who have graciously opened their homes to the Elders and Saints who came to attend conferences.

Although there has been a very unhealthy season in this territory on account of the heavy rains and high water during the spring, the health of the Elders is very good. It is gratifying with the exception of Elder Matney, who is rapidly recovering from an attack of malarial fever, and the remainder is now over the prospects are good for proselyting during the coming winter.
