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SEVENTEENTH WARD.

The Seventeenth Ward Improvement Association will meet to-morrow evening, in the Council House, the Ward Meeting-house being still under repairs. Half-past seven is the time for commencing the exercises.

Gardening. - The season for gardening approaches. As soon as the ground gets sufficiently dry, probably in two or three weeks, especially on bench lots, it will be time to commence sowing and planting. Such products as delight in cold soil most can be put in the ground earliest - as, for instance, beets, radishes, peas, turnips, rutabagas, &c. Such articles as beans, cucumbers, melons, squashes, and the like must be put in later.

Account of an Accident. - Brother William Aldridge writes as from Pleasant Grove that there has been considerable misunderstanding in relation to an accident that befell Thos. Forsyth, of Toquerville, Kane County, a short distance north of Provo, on Friday, the 5th inst. In consequence also of peculiar circumstances connected with the affair he sends what he claims to be the correct version of it. Brother Forsyth was leaving Provo for Salt Lake, on the date named, and had reached the bench above the city first mentioned, when he jumped upon the double-track to get into the wagon, lost his balance, put his hand upon the hind quarter of one of the animals to steady himself, when the horse gave a spring, throwing him to the ground. Both wheels passed over him, breaking his collar bone and inflicting other injuries. Three strangers driving ahead of him came to his assistance, and took him to the nearest house. He got the men to drive his team, on promise to pay them. On reaching Pleasant Grove Brother Forsyth discovered that his pocket book, containing \$75 and valuable papers had been abstracted from the pocket of his coat, which was in his wagon. By advice of friends at Pleasant Grove, Brother Forsyth placed the matter in the hands of the law officers, but with what result Brother Aldridge fails to state. He intimates rather strongly, however, that suspicion of robbery was firm in relation to the three men who picked the injured man up after the accident.
