PALISADE, IDAHO.

A Fine Country, With Room for Home Seekers-Smallpox Epidemic. Special Correspondence.

Palisade Ward, Irwin P. O., Bingham co., Idaho, March 8 .- This valley is called Swan valley, and is situated about fifty-five miles above Idaho Falls. on the South fork of the Snake river. We have had a nice winter this year, very little snow in the valley, but plenty in the mountains.

We have room for more settlers. There is abundance of water, and plen-ty of timber of all kinds close by, with saw mill about four miles up in the mountains. Lumber is \$10 per thou-sand. This is a great place in summer for tourists from all over the country, travelling to the Yellowstone Park, via

Teton valley and Jackson Hole. We expect in the very near future to be blessed with a railroad, the surveyors were at work last fall in the Grand canyon, at the upper end of this valley. Many travel through here from the north end of Star valley. We have a splendid cattle range here. The sheep men have not paid us a visit yet. We have a Church organization here eighteen families, with Brother John Castle presiding.

This valley has always been noted for health: but this winter has brought a change, for smallpox has found us and we have had over ninety cases, but none fatal: mostly all cases were mild. The yellow flag adorned some of our houses for six weeks. Some parties express themselves that the quarantine regulations in Bingham county were worse than the disease. We have two post offices, one at each

end of the valley, and a semi-weekly Sleigh riding is a thing of the past,
