In addition to this order, druggists have been cautioned to use great care in dispens-ing intoxicating liquors for medicinal purposes, and to sell for no other pur-pose under penalty of the law.

AMERICANS IN PHILIPPIN'S.

London Daily Mail Publishes Letters Showing Their Alleged Failure.

New York, May 6.-The Daily Mail today publishes the first of a series of letters from Percival Landon its special correspondent at Manila, showing the American failure in the Philippines, ca-bles the World's London representative. Mr. Landon declares that the American campaign has made no impression in the islands; that the firing-line is coextensive with the coast line and that a feeling of utter insecurity prevails

at headquarters. The correspondent asserts that in a country depending entirely upon agriculture for its pros-perity the land is being largely aban-doned. He says it is time for the United States to decide whether there might be a reconsideration of its policy of the past few years.
