MOSQUITOES AS PUBIFIERS. - The eggs of the mosquito are laid in a bowlshaped mass upon the surface of stagnant water, by the mother-fly. After hatching out, they finally become the "wiggle-tails" or wriggling worms that may be seen in the Summer, in any bar-rel of (water that is exposed to the atsurface, and the full fledged mosquito bursts out of them, at first with very short limp wings, which in a very short time grow both in length and stiffness.
