Genuine Case of Supposed Smallpox

—Return of Winter.

Mr. Pleasant, Sanpete County, April 7.—Beyond a doubt we have at last received a faint touch of smallpox. Miss Adele Candalian came home the other day from Eureka feeling ill. Had been only two days when symptoms of the disease began to appear. A stringent quarantine was soon in force, many have been exposed to date.

There is no question about it. Winter has come again. Since conference began it has been raining till last night when it began snowing. This morning two inches of snow covers the earth and snow will be on the way.

Immediately after the transfer, the new street railway corporation will proceed to make some very extensive improvements in the system. One of the principal improvements will be the purchase of new cars. A number of large car building factories have been notified by the Ogden gentlemen that they are in the market to buy the cars wanted, and just as soon as the formal business is transacted, a committee of two or three of the company will leave for the east to visit factories and buy the cars. It is intended that at least three months will be required to do this.

The Washington Avenue cars are to be built 2 feet long—double-truck. Maximum traction, vestibule, cross-sash, and equipped with all modern street car devices.

The Twenty-second and Twenty-fifth street cars, will be of the same pattern, only shorter and with single trucks. It is intended to have the Washington Avenue cars with two compartments separated with a glass partition, with doors on each side so that when the gentlemen wish to smoke, they can go into the smoking apartment.

There will also be considerable work done on the entire line, and the overhead work on Washington Avenue will all new, as the old wiring is very badly worn. With respect to extensions, Mr. Weaver said: "We can assure the public that during this past winter we made no extensions whatever, but if possible next year we will extend our line considerably."

The Big Canal Will be Finished This Fall—Discoveries of Precious Metals, Petroleum and Coal.

Ten new residences were erected in Cardston, a large addition built to the meeting house with an auditorium that will accommodate from four to five hundred persons, and a modern school house.

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
