

SUSPECT MORALES COMMITTS SUICIDE

Man Believed to Have Thrown
Bomb at King Alfonso and
Queen Victoria.

GUARD TRIED TO DETAIN HIM.

Shot Him Down, Failed to Escape
And Then Turned Revolver
On Himself.

Madrid, June 3.—The capture and suicide Saturday night at Torrejon de Ardoz of Manuel Morales, the chief suspect of the bomb outrage against King Alfonso and Queen Victoria, adds another dramatic chapter to the events surrounding the royal wedding.

Morales was recognized in the little town of Torrejon de Ardoz, midway between Madrid and Alcala. A guard sought to detain him, but Morales, drawing a revolver, shot the guard dead. Then he turned to the mob a number of the inhabitants of the town were upon him, and turning the revolver upon himself, he sent a shot in the region of his heart, expiring a few minutes later. Señor Cuesta, proprietor of the hotel from the balcony of which Morales threw the bomb, viewed the body this morning and completely identified it as that of his recent guest.

It was 8 o'clock Saturday evening when Morales, disguised in the garb of a workman, entered the station at Torrejon de Ardoz. He asked a child who was in charge of the office the time the next train would depart for Barcelona. He then sought food in a nearby shop. His Catalanian accent first attracted attention to him. It was then noticed that his workman's suit was entirely new and while corresponding in texture to that usually worn by a person of his station in life, his face and manner showing him to be a man of some distinction.

A private watchman from a neighboring estate chanced to be present, and he noticed the facial resemblance of Morales to the description given out of the man seen on the balcony from which the bomb was thrown, particularly the long, thin and deeply scarred face and the closely-cropped mustache. He then observed that a finger on the man's left hand which the stranger was trying to conceal was badly hurt, and that there was also a small fresh scar on his forehead. The stranger started out on a road leading into the country, but the watchman intercepted him and demanded to know his identity. Morales declined to give this, whereupon a guard arrested him. Instantly Morales drew a revolver from his pocket and fired, the bullet falling dead. Morales started up the road, but a small group of villagers barred his passage. Then, turning around, he deliberately pointed the weapon to his heart, fired and pitched forward in the roadway.

An examination of the pockets of the dead man showed that they contained \$36 in money and a small supply of bread and cheese, but there was nothing in them that would give a clue as to his identity.

This fact created a doubt that the man was Morales, but when the governor of Madrid arrived with Cuesta, identification was immediate and positive. The body was then brought to Madrid. At first there was a desire to bury it at Torrejon de Ardoz, but when this was suggested the governor indignantly refused to permit the body to repose in its town.

A close examination of the dead man showed that there were three abrasions on the body beside the death wound—one on the hand, one under the left eye and one on the forehead. His disguise was complete to the last detail even including the common steel watch ordinarily carried by workmen.

The body of Morales was exposed this afternoon to the gaze of the public indignation. Thousands of persons surged before the municipal morgue seeking to get in line to be admitted to the room where the body lay, but cavalry and infantry blocked the efforts of the throng, which moved and impetuous upon the assassin. Public feeling was intense, because of the great number of victims. It is said that a bomb explosion has had such deadly effect, in this instance being 24 persons killed and more than 30 wounded.

Final disposition of the body of Morales has not yet been determined upon, but the public demands an ignominious burial.

CONSIDERED SON AS DEAD.

Barcelona, June 3.—Señor Morales, father of the anarchist who attempted to kill King Alfonso and Queen Victoria, and who committed suicide at Torrejon de Ardoz, Saturday night, was seen at Barcelona today. He is the proprietor of a prosperous factory there. He has a strong individuality and is highly respected. Answering the questions of an inspector of police concerning his son, he said:

"I wish to know nothing of this infamous creature formerly bearing my name. I have not considered him my son since I drove him from my house March 1. The reason for his being cast out was purely domestic, and I beg to be excused from discussing it. I do not know whether he was connected with the attempt on the lives of the king and queen, as I have considered him dead since he was cast out March 1."

Morales' brother, Facundo, gave these details concerning the dead man:

"At an early age he was sent to the mercantile centers of Germany and France, where he became an expert in textile production, but his natural bent was chemistry, and he returned to his home with a library of German and French works on chemistry. His unusual disposition led to family troubles, which culminated in his father disowning him. Then Morales translated German chemical books for the Ecole Moderne at Barcelona. He lived quietly in a boardinghouse and had few acquaintances. He left Barcelona recently, saying that he would be gone for a long time."

NOT KNOWN IN LONDON.

London, June 4.—The dramatic story from Madrid of the suicide of the would-be assassin of King Alfonso and Queen Victoria, together with the discovery of bombs at Ansona, Italy, supposed to be used against King Victor Emmanuel, has led the newspapers here to keenly discuss the anarchist question. The London police disclaim any knowledge of the anarchist Morales, and deny that he is the man who threw the bomb at the wedding.

It has been stated that the Spanish government will communicate with the British foreign office concerning the attempt on the lives of King Alfonso and Queen Victoria. This, however, is incorrect. The matter has been left entirely in the hands of the police.

In Paris it seems to be believed that Morales was none other than the misanthropic Paris, or Avine, who threw a bomb at King Alfonso in Paris two years ago.

Great Britain's attitude might perhaps be modified with advantage with regard to the assassin of King Alfonso, but contends that it is a subject bristling with difficulties and calling for most careful investigation.

William Melville, late chief of the special police service in Scotland Yard, who, during the tenure of that office was in close touch with the anarchist movement, informs the Daily Telegraph that seven years ago the London police frustrated an attempt to assassinate King Alfonso and his mother by the discovery of a plot against them in London, and the pursuit and capture of the plotters at Bordeaux while they were on their way to San Sebastian to carry out the assassination.

GEN. MILES SAYS EMBALMED BEEF KILLED SOLDIERS.

Kansas City, June 3.—Gen. Nelson A. Miles, who is here on his way to Colorado to address the state university students, said tonight:

"The disclosures about beef and other packing house products now being expatriated are no news to me. I knew it seven years ago. I told what I knew then. Had the nation taken action at that time thousands of lives would have been saved. The adulteration of food products is the colossal crime of the times."

"I believe that 3,000 United States soldiers lost their lives because adulterated, impure, poisonous meat. There is no way to estimate the number of soldiers whose health was ruined by eating impure food. I know only of its havoc among the soldiers and can only guess how many lives it has cost the republic."

"I have a barrel of testimony on the subject in the way of affidavits that I collected when I made my investigation seven years ago. The investigating committee closed the case and refused to hear 200 witnesses whom I had ready. At that time I had secured the testimony of 100,000 men that the canned beef sold to the army was impure, adulterated and unwholesome."

"In my investigation of 'emphaloid' beef during the Spanish-American war I found that poisons were being used to preserve meat. My first intimation of the practice came to me in reports from commanding officers in the field that the rations were not wholesome and were making the soldiers sick. I ordered an investigation and learned from the reports brought to me that canned meat had been sold to the army that had been for months in the warehouses of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad and at the docks in Liverpool."

"This meat had been re-labeled and sold to the United States for soldiers' rations. I turned the reports over to the war department and a wholesale investigation was instituted and successfully carried out. The official report was that a 'colossal error' had been made. As a matter of fact, it was a colossal fraud, and the persons who perpetrated it were interested in it should have been sent to the penitentiary."

BIG FIRE IN OMAHA.

Loss Great and Some Firemen Nearly
Lost Their Lives.

Omaha, Neb., June 3.—A very insignificant fire was the indirect cause of heavy damage to the stock of the Hayden Bros. department store at 810 Tenth and Dodge streets and the narrow escape from death of 15 firemen and a police surgeon this afternoon. The fire, which was of unknown origin, started in a furniture store on a street fronting the department store. It burned for more than 100,000 damages when it started the automatic sprinkler, which flooded the entire five floors of the building before it was discovered. The total value of the stock is given at \$450,000 and the damage at one-half that amount, fully covered by insurance.

The fire had evidently been smoldering for some time before it was discovered, for the room was so filled with carbonic gas that the first firemen to enter the building were overcome and those who went to their rescue rapidly succumbed until it was necessary to take 15 of them, including Chief Salter, Asst. Chief Simpson, Capt. Sullivan, Coyle and Oleson and Lieut. Erickson, to the hospital, where they were all overcome while attending them at the scene of the fire. The firemen all reported for duty this afternoon and none are in a serious condition.

TO PRESERVE NIAGARA FALLS.

Washington, June 3.—Chairman Burton of the house rivers and harbors committee has submitted a report upon the bill to protect Niagara Falls. The report says in part:

"The committee regards the jurisdiction of the United States over Niagara river as unquestionable, because it is a navigable stream in the greater part of its length. The bill authorizes the issuance of permits to individuals, companies, or corporations already using water to the extent to which water is now being used."

"The issuance of further permits for the diversion of water on the side of the United States and for the transmission of electricity created by water power from the Canadian side, this, however, in all cases, with the limitation that such permits shall not impair the scenic grandeur of Niagara Falls, the place where the river, or its integrity as a boundary stream."

"All permits to be granted under the bill are revocable within three years by the secretary of war and shall in any event terminate at the expiration of three years."

JEWISH SORROW FOR DAVIT.

Kishineff, June 3.—There was a large meeting of Jews here today called to express their sorrow at the death of Michael Davit. An address of condolence with his widow was formulated. In 1903 Mr. Davit was the administrator of a fund raised in the United States for the victims of the Kishineff pogrom and he won the warm respect and sympathy of the Bessarabian Jews.

MEXICAN NEW LINE OPENED.

Mazatlan, Mex. June 3.—The first link of the Guaymas-Guadalupe extension of the Southern Pacific, extending from a point on the Sonora railway, nine kilometers above Guaymas, to Torin, a distance of 72 kilometers, will be opened to freight and passenger traffic this morning.

MONEY FOR S. F. M. C. A.

Indianapolis, June 3.—The convention of the organized officers of the Y. M. C. A. of North America has endorsed the efforts of the San Francisco Y. M. C. A. to obtain \$400,000 with which to replace the building destroyed in the recent fire and earthquake.

NATIONAL JEWISH HOSPITAL.

Chicago, June 3.—The sixth annual meeting of the National Jewish hospital for consumptives at Denver was held here today. All the officers were re-elected. A suggestion by President Garfield that a loan fund be established for the benefit of discharged patients who are acted upon favorably, as was also a recommendation that a school be established for the instruction of Russian patients. The advisability of establishing trade school for discharged patients, which was recommended by the committee at Atlantic

MINERS DEMAND TRIAL FOR MOYER

Condemn "Highhanded Conspiracy on Part of Govs. Gooding and McDonald."

SEND GREETINGS TO MEXICANS

To Those at Cananea in Their Efforts
For a Higher Standard of
Living.

Denver, June 3.—The convention of the Western Federation of Miners today adopted resolutions bearing on the imprisonment of their head officers in Idaho, and also the trouble yesterday at Cananea, Mexico. The former read as follows:

RESOLUTIONS:

"Whereas, The trial of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone has been postponed until next December; and

"Whereas, The prosecution of the state of Idaho has had the trial postponed to find out whether they can legally hold the prisoners after having kidnapped them, and

"Whereas, This body of delegates to the fourteenth annual convention have every confidence in the innocence of our officers; therefore be it

"Resolved, That we, in convention assembled, condemn this highhanded and damnable conspiracy on the part of Gov. Gooding and McDonald and the Mine Owners' association, and demand that either the prisoners have a trial immediately, or be released on bonds. Be it further

"Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be wired to President Roosevelt and Senator Patterson, at Washington, D. C."

The resolutions on the Cananea trouble follows:

"Whereas, The telegraphic dispatches herald the fact that the Mexicans in the mines of Cananea, Mex., are for an increase in wages, and through these attempts for better conditions violence is now rampant in Mexico; and

"Whereas, The Western Federation of Miners recognize the class struggle throughout the world, and know no race nor creed in the battle for industrial freedom; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That while we deplore the loss of life and property, the Western Federation of Miners, in convention assembled, send greetings to the Mexican workers, trusting that their efforts for a higher standard of living will be crowned with success."

Telegrams were received from former President Bove expressing regret at being unable to attend the convention and from the headquarters of the International Union of United Brewery Workers at Cincinnati, extending sympathy to Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone, and pledging their organization to remain with them to the last.

The convention continued to discuss amendments to the constitution and bylaws. The question of extending the chain of papers and magazines published by the organization was passed up to the executive committee with instructions to act as their judgment dictated.

TRIBUTE TO CONFEDERATE DEAD IN ARLINGTON.

Washington, June 3.—Several thousand persons today visited the national cemetery at Arlington, where, with music and oratory, tribute was paid to the Confederate soldiers whose bodies lie at rest beside the soldiers of the north. The exercises were held in the Confederate section of the cemetery, where lie 26 Confederates who died in hospitals and prisons in the vicinity of Washington, and whose bodies were placed there through the act of two late President McKinley. The services were under the auspices of the Confederate Veteran association of Washington, the Daughters of the Confederacy and the Southern Relief society.

Music was furnished by the cavalry band. Addresses were made by Representative John Sharp Williams of Mississippi and Hillary A. Herbert, former secretary of the United States. A feature of the day was the unveiling of the "Southern Cross" by Miss Elizabeth Gould. An immense floral wreath on which was inscribed the word "Fraternity" and the gift of the Confederate association of the district, was placed on the monument to the unknown Union dead, while a beautiful climax of the day's ceremonies was the dedication of the "newly-made grave of Gen. Joseph Wheeler."

PANAMA DELEGATES.

Want United States to Mediate in Approaching Elections.

New York, June 3.—Drs. P. Alvarez, A. E. Morales and R. Parres and Gen. B. Diaz of the Liberal party in Panama arrived here today on the steamer Alliance from Colon. They came here to urge the mediation of the United States government in the approaching elections. Dr. Alvarez, who leads the party, said:

"We ask for the parity of the ballot box. We represent the greater part of the people, but the party in power is making every effort to retain control by all the machinery of the government. They have passed the list of eligibles, leaving out all the names of the opposition, thus disfranchising a large proportion of the people. We, the liberal and conservative element

desire to make Panama a real republic, and not one as the world regards them, of South and Central America.

"Of course, you know that rebellion is not regarded in the same way as you of the United States view rebellion. We are rebels today, tomorrow the other party will be thought such. We wish to avoid this condition, which has been so much deplored in other republics. We want a fair and square election, and it becometh us to agree with the result."
