GEN. CHAFFEE **REVEALS A SECRET**

He Would Have Seized Eighty Million Dollars' Worth of Treasure.

BUT M'KINLEY FORBADE HIM

Knew Its Exact Location in the Forbidden City-He Emphatically Benies the Looting.

New York, Jap. 10 .- If President Mc-Kinley had not forbidden it, Gen, Adna R. Chaffee admitted, in an address at the Hamilton club, in Brooklyn, where he was the guest of honor at a dinner in commemoration of the birthday of Alexander Hamilton, he would have selzed treasure worth \$80,000,000 when he was in command of the American

troops in China. He knew exactly the location of this treasure in the forbidden city and had planned to take possession of it, he said, when the president veloed the proposition. It was his intention to hold out an amount that might be settled upon as a proper indemnity, and return the remainder to the Chinese government.

We and the Japanese had the hon we and the supariese had the hon-or of guarding the gate to the forbid-den city," said Gen. Chaffee, "and we have had to endure the mortification of having been charged with allowing

of having been charged with allowing a great amount of looting, but it is a fact that the forbidden city was not looted to the amount of \$500. "Within those walls, however, was the greatest preusure in the Chinese empire, including the jewels of the em-press dowager. So great was its vol-ume that it took a hundred Chinese solders 20 days to transport it from the Winter palace to the house where it Winter palace to the house where it was secreted. They Will Receive Millions More Than Ever Before.

EMPLOYERS GIVE INCREASE

Twelve Hundred Thousand Railroad Employes Affected -- Many Concerns Take Men Into Corporation.

New York, Jan, 9 .- Wage earners throughout the United States will receive, by many millions, more money during 1903 than ever before in the history of the country.

Increases in wages granted by the great railroad and industrial corporaone within the last two months show that during the coming year 656,800 employes will receive \$38,350,000 more than they did last year. Negotiations a.c now in progress by which 110,000 employes of various railroads in the westand south will receive increases aggregating \$4,000,000 annually.

Scores upon scores of small corporations or business firms, each employing a few hundred men or women, have made wage advances. There is no way of computing exactly the number of these or the employes or the amounts involved, but a conservative estimate of the grand total of employes who will receive higher wages during 1903 is 900,-000, and the sum involved will be in the neighborhood of \$50,600,090. Fitty millions of dollars more in the

pockets of the wage earners for the year means nearly \$1,000,000 more a week, or about \$165,000 for each of the working days.

Rallroad men receive a more generous share of the increase in wages than any other class of workingmen. There are about 1,203,000 men employed by the railroads of the country, including everybody from the labore ap to the president. Of these 1,200,000 over 600,000 or more than one-half, will receive on an average 10 per cent more in wages an average 10 per cent more in wages than they did in 1902.

Not only have direct increases in wages been granted, but other corporations have devixed schemes by which employes will be able to share substantially in the profits realized. A notable instance of this kind is the plan of the United States Steel corporation, the greatest employer of labor in the coun-

to enable every employe down to the commonest laborer to become a stock-holder, \$2,000,000 of the preferred stock has been set aside to be sold during the coming year at a price lower than the present market rate. Payments are to be made in installments, and if necessary the payments can be divided over a period of three years. From the outset the employe receives the dividends, and at the expiration of a certain period, as long as he remains in the em-ploy of the company and retains possession of the stock, he is to receive an extra bonus of \$5 a share. Another sum, based upon the net nings of the company, is to be set Have you a courd aside annually for division among those employes chiefly responsible for the business success of the corporation. The Republic Iron and Steel company has also adopted a profit-sharing play with its employes, but less elaborate than that devised by the United States

High Winds in Colorado. Estes Park, Colo., Jan. 10-High vinds which have been blowing for three days have completely wrecked the summer cottage district in the park. All the cottages were vacant and this alone prevented loss of life. Buildings occupied by permanent residents of the park, being more substantial resisted the force of the wind to a great extent, althought many of these were damaged more or less.

Large trees were taken up by the roots or broken off above the ground and blown a great distance. It is impossible to estimate the damage done. but it will probably reach up into the thousands. The damage to ranchmen in the park consisted chiefly to fences, miles of which were blown down, and the outbuildings which were raised to the grounds.

Steel corporation. The closing months of 1902 were characterized by a general movement on the part of large employers of labor, corpo rate and individual, not only to more liberally on the wage question but to provide intelligent and feasible means by which employes would be permanently benefited.

Some of the increases made were not altogether voluntary, particularly on the part of railroads which were threatened with a tie-up in the most prosper ous season in the country's history. majority of the increases were, how majority of the increases were, how-ever, purely voluntary, the officials granting them being actuated in part by the higher cost of living and a de-sire to distribute a share of the enor-mous profits of their companies among the men.

The wave of wage increasing way started early in November by the Pennvivania Railroad company, which unxpectedly made the announcement that the pay of every one of its 146,000 employes would be raised 10 per cent This increase involves the immense sum of about \$9,000,000 annually. It was the greatest single increase of the kind in the history of the country.

A few days later the New York Central made announcement of an increase to its employes, and then from all parts of the country came similar announcements.

A new standard of wage was finally set and those roads which have not yet raised the pay of their men to higher level have been asked to do so.

Stockholders in the roads which have made the increases will not suffer, in fact the indications are that they will gain materially by the increase, as it was employed as a reason for advancing freight rates from 10 to 20 per cent A 10 per cent advance in freights brings in on an average \$2 for every \$1 paid out on a 10 per cent advance in wages. Thus while operating expenses of the railroads which have made wage in creases will be much heavier, the gross receipts will grow almost doubly fast, and in the end the sum applicable for dividends will be considerably greater than it was last year.

H. P. H. BROMWELL DEAD.

Was An Authority on Masonic Law And Lore.
