

mission will consist of nine members and be under the presidency of Ismail Bey. The second orders a court martial with eight members, Reouf Pasha presiding, to be held in Cairo, and that it shall give judgment according to the military code without appeal in all cases submitted to the committee. The third directs the assembly in Alexandria of another court-martial to try all cases submitted by the tribunals recently appointed in Alexandria and Toulah. The proceedings of both court-martials will be public, and the accused will be permitted to employ counsel.

The Khedive will soon issue a decree granting amnesty from all offences from captain downward engaged in the rebellion, excepting those who participated in the riots or joined the army since the beginning of the campaign.

Constantinople, 27. — Gen. Wallace, United States Minister, obtained from the Sultan the release of several Greeks arrested in Janina in 1881 for participating in the political demonstration against Turkey, who were subsequently brought to Constantinople.

Eugene Schuyler, the United States Consul General, has gone to Athens.

Madrid, 27. — Marshall Zerrano, the Liberal leader, announces his intention to declare for the Constitution of June 1st, 1869, which made the King irresponsible and placed all responsibility upon the ministers. The ministry and its supporters have resolved to oppose the change.

Panama, 27. — The earthquake killed only four persons on the isthmus and one woman died from fright. The damage to property is not so great as at first reported.

Montaneros is Deruyans who afforded aid to the Chilians. The American schooner *Transit* is reported seized at Cape Gracias Adios. Nicaragua was captured by the revolutionists, who hoped they could thus capture San Juan del Norte, generally called Greytown. A man named Emiliano Herrera seized the town and declared himself "Chief of the Provisional Government of the Atlantic Coast," and under his authorization the schooner *Transit* was seized. She was subsequently recaptured by Capt. Thompson and his men, and the rebels were carried to Bluefield, Nicaragua, and delivered into the custody of the United States consul. After the *Transit* left Cape Gracias Adios the populace arose against the rebels, seized them and executed the two leaders, Emiliano Herrera and Miguel Orlera, and thus peace was at once restored. The consul took the prisoners delivered to him by Capt. Thompson to Georgetown and turned them over to the Nicaraguan government at that port who in turn sent them to Granada, where they are now in prison.

Dr. Anice D'Arze, one of the richest and most highly educated Bolivians, was elected President of the Bolivian Congress. He is a staunch advocate of peace at any price.

LONDON, 28. — The Bank of Bengal has reduced the rate of discount from five to four per cent.

Cairo, 28. — Contrary to rumors, General Wooley will not leave here for a fortnight.

An ammunition train exploded near the Cairo railway depot. The explosions still continue. Arabs and Europeans are fleeing from the scene. Thirty persons are reported killed.

Dublin, 28. — A farmer named Hickley, in Tipperary county, has been murdered for paying rent in violation of an order of the local land league and for assisting in defense of some men employed in gathering crops on a farm. The evicted tenant was named Carroll. Carroll's family was arrested.

Constantinople, 28. — Five battalions of troops have been dispatched to Hedjaz, Arabia, where an outbreak is reported; probably connected with the recent deposition of the Grand Sherief of Mecca.

Constantinople, 28. — Lord Dufferin communicated to Lord Granville a note from the Porte, thanking Great Britain for re-establishing order in Egypt and expressing a hope that the bonds of friendship at present subsisting between Turkey and England may become still closer. Mr. Granville has replied expressing satisfaction at the sentiments of the Ottoman Government.

London, 28. — A Vienna newspaper publishes a story to the effect that the Emperor and Empress of Russia were secretly crowned during their recent visit to Moscow. If the Emperor survives till a public coronation the secret coronation will be considered void, but in the event of

his death it will be made public, so as to avoid any difficulty in proclaiming the Czarowitch Alexander the lawful successor of the crowned monarch.

CAIRO, 28. — There have been riots in several towns in upper Egypt owing to the efforts of officials to enforce demonstrations of loyalty to the Khedive. Flags and other devices have been torn down by mobs and Christians insulted and maltreated.

Alexandria, 28. — It is stated that two companies of the 49th regiment have been ordered to Tantah.

The Egyptian government is in possession of a telegram from Prince Ibrahim to Arabi Pasha, congratulating him upon a supposed Egyptian victory at Kassassin, and hoping that at the next feast of Balam, Englishmen would be sacrificed instead of sheep.

COTARO, 28. — Disturbances have broken out among the Montenegrins in Kolaschin. Governor Bazar sent a body of Nizals to occupy Turkish Kolaschin.

TOMBSTONE, Sept. 14, 1882.

Editor Deseret News:

I wrote you in relation to Elder McDonald and company making a visit to the good people of St David and meetings held, on the 7th inst., President McDonald added eighteen of the St. Davidites to his Salt River company and made a start for San Bernardino ranch, located on the line between the United States and Sonora. On the 8th we called on many gentlemen in this place, also the Episco consul, Ignacio Bonillas, who gave us a letter of introduction to the custom house officers on the San Pedro, we also received letters from Americans who were well acquainted over the lines. The 9th we reached the White River near the Chirichua Mountains, where Elder John W. Campbell has his steam saw mill located, Elder Trejo was dispatched after Elder John, whom we wished to join our party. On the morning of the 10th the two brethren made their appearance, when we returned on our trail four miles, then followed a southern course some 12 or 15 miles, camping on the east side of Sulphur Springs valley. On the 11th we reached Willow Springs located at the beginning of a natural pass at or near the south end of the Chirichua mountains. Not having water the night previous for our horses we were much refreshed. Breaking our fast we proceeded six or eight miles to Silver Creek and thence down grade to the initial point where we arrived about 5 o'clock camping about 600 yards from the monument south in Sonora.

On the 12th we advanced three or four miles down the creek and while testing the good cool waters flowing from natural springs Bro. Freeman Hubbard killed two small deer or fawns. At this point we had dinner, after which a consultation was held, and the line of march decided upon to return home, we reached Silver Creek, camping overnight. The 13th Messrs. Hill, Reed, Sessions and myself reached this point for the purpose of advertising a meeting to be held this evening in the Court House, when Elder A. F. McDonald will discourse upon the principles of "Mormonism" to the people of Tombstone.

The result of our visit to the San Bernardino Rancho will be determined in the future to the joy of many.

Elder B. F. Johnson found ample room in the valleys of Sulphur Springs and San Bernardino to gratify his botanical genius. Several who accompanied the above expedition were invalids, and are fast recovering their wonted health and strength. Hoping ere long to give more satisfactory information, I continue your Brother,

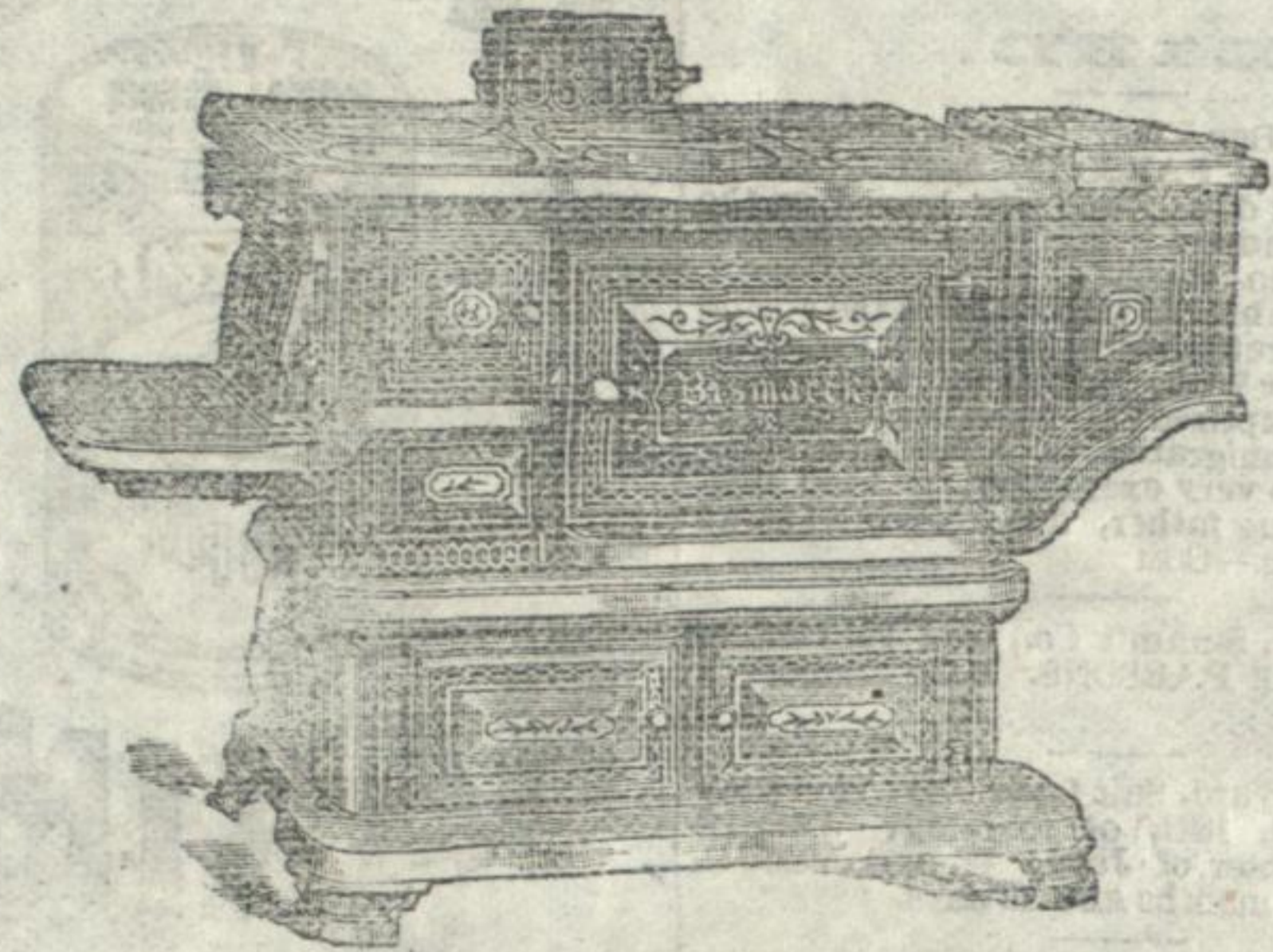
