Weeks, chairman of the executive committee of the union. Mr. Weeks made the announcement last night after reading the evidence taken at the hearing on the charges brought against Ewry by Matthew P. Halpin. The board of governors of the union will meet within a few days and it is expected that important matters will be taken up, including the Ewry case. There is much dissatisfaction in the ranks of the union, it is said, and important changes are looked for as the result of this meeting.
