SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 18.—Logan pre-

sented a remonstrance of the Union

Veteran Club, numbering 1,000 ex-

soldiers, against the Weaver bill, the

ground being that if passed the bill

would distract the business interests

of the country.

The Senate took up the bill pen-

sioning Herman Kettledick, but

after morning hours, the five per

cent bill was taken up. It had

been reported by the committee

favoring it, and it was passed by

a vote of 54 to 41.

The bill was then sent to the

House, where it was taken up

and passed by a vote of 100 to

70.

The bill was then sent to the
