the largest to the smallest, they worked. They tramped around town in the evening sun every day and then practised earnestly in the evenings to get speed for last night's races. Speed? Two records were broken and every race called out the very best in every man. And every man gave the very best in him. There were little things on the program that added to the interest of the evening. Hitting Nelson, champion lightweight of the world, was introduced and given an ovation. A hundred small boys rushed up to the little battler to shake hands with him. One tiny archer yelled "Let's see your face, Bat. Let's shake hands." "Bat" shook hands and at the sight of the smiling little one, Nelson being half-dragged along the track by a hundred boys clinging to his hands, the crowd went wild.

KETCHUP RECORD.

Another feature, not on the cards, and a big hit was the Ketchup record established by "Red" Robinson, messenger boy-racer. Juggling a loaded tray on his head, Robinson went around the track without spilling a thing. Down the bell lap "Red" made as hard a sprint as one could wish to see; the crowd was up on its feet laughing and cheering. When "Red" slowed down, he walked up to Mayor Bransford and presented him with a sandwich. The time of the half-mile was announced as 1:17, and the race was dubbed the "Mayor's special."

Mayor Bransford fired the pistol which started the motor race between Whittier and Samuelson. This was the first time the evening and was run first to get it over before the oval became filled. But the crowd was so great, before the races began, that it had been decided to go carefully after trying out a terrific sprint. Fair time was made, however, the five miles being covered in 6:11 3-5. Whittier got place.

HOPPER RECORD MILE.

As was expected, the Hopper record mile established a new record and had not been for a long time. A much lower figure would have been made. At least three seconds were lost before the riders could overcome the bad start they got, but even with this they made it 1:49 2-5, breaking the world's record by 3-5 of a second. The western amateur championship

fight narrowed down to Crebs, Lawrence and Schnell. The last named rode as he never rode before and when Crebs jumped to the lead, made "Musty" ride as he had never ridden before to keep the lead. Lawrence of California made a desperate effort to get across the tape first, but Schnell and Crebs were just as well without them, and that it would injure the track for the remainder of the season to have these two men ride at the single meeting. Therefore I dropped the matter entirely.

WHAT REDMAN SAYS.

Manager Redman had this to say: "In regard to the statement of Mr. Chapman, what I did say at the first meeting was that I would object to Mayor and Clarke being made starters at the meet. Mr. Chapman said that he would object to them riding and being made 'dues' of. I said I did not object to giving them an equal chance with the riders. At the second meeting, after consulting with my associates, I informed the committee that Mayor and Clarke could ride in any manner in which the committee decided to put them."

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## WHY CLARK AND MAYER WERE OUT

Boys Wanted To, But Muddle  
Prevented Them From  
Doing So.

### PLAIN STATEMENTS OF ALL

Little Flare-Up Did Not Interfere  
With Meet Attaining Unprecedented Success, However.

It was announced at the Hopper meet last evening that Manager Chapman of the Salt Lake saucer had refused to let Clarke and Mayer ride in the meet. This part of the meet story has no business with the other so is given by itself for that reason. The announcement, made by Announcer Hughes and hoisted and hissed by the crowd, was:

"At the request of the referee and officials, I wish to announce that Mayor and Clarke will not appear at this meet, owing to the fact that Manager Chapman has a contract for them to ride exclusively for him and refuses to allow them to appear." This statement was signed "O. K.—F. L. Gardner, N. C. A. representative."

CHAPMAN'S STATEMENT.

Manager Chapman makes the following statement:

"I attended the first meeting held by the riders and newspaper men to arrange for a benefit meet for Norman Hopper. I was present at the invitation of some of the riders with the view of donating the services of Mayor and Clarke for the benefit meet. In this meeting, Mr. Redman made the statement that he would rather not have Mayor and Clarke ride, as he could get the crowd just as well without them, and that it would injure the track for the remainder of the season to have these two men ride at the single meeting. Therefore I dropped the matter entirely."

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
