

TRAIN PLUNGES INTO THE MISSOURI

Six Lives Lost, Thirty-six Persons Injured, Three of Them Probably Fatally.

ACCIDENT WAS ON WABASH.

Roadbed Had Been Undermined by Flood Waters, Fifty Feet Suddenly Collapsing.

Kansas City, July 25.—Six lives lost and 36 persons injured, three perhaps fatally, is the result of the wreck of Wabash passenger train No. 4, when it plunged into the Missouri river, 30 miles east of here, last night.

The train left Kansas City at 9

o'clock Saturday night, and was due in St. Louis 10 hours later. Of the eight cars which made up the train five and the engine are now in the river with the water covering all of them except one end of the Des Moines sleeper. A deadhead Pullman, mail, baggage, day coach and sleeper followed the engine into the stream. The chair car and two Pullmans remained uninjured.

At the scene of the wreck the river makes a bend and the railroad follows it. For days the floodwaters have been undermining the roadbed, making it too weak to hold up the heavy trains. Three hours before the wreck a freight of 45 loaded cars passed the point safely. Three hours later No. 4 started across the same bit of track. Fifty feet of the roadbed suddenly collapsed, and engine and cars piled one upon the other in the water.

The train was running 14 miles an hour, but the telescoping of the forward cars allowed the three rear cars to stop so gradually that their occupants were hardly shaken.

Eight mail clerks were saved only by the fact that the roof of their car was torn off and allowed them to get out on top of the car and swim for the shore.

None escaped injury. In the Des Moines sleeper E. T. King was holding his little son when the crash came. The child was instantly killed, and Mr. King was unconscious when found.

Dr. Turner Lohveck, a woman physician of St. Louis, was the heroine of the wreck, according to railroad officials and passengers. In 30 minutes she gave temporary relief to the 27 injured persons, several women passengers assisting her by preparing bandages.

"It seemed to me that every woman there tore up her skirts for dressings," said Dr. Lohveck. "Everything was freely given by the uninjured, and many complied with the barest of wearing apparel. The eight mail clerks refused treatment until all the passengers were attended to. Soon after all their injured had been given temporary attention, relief came."

The engine of a local freight train, which was just behind the wrecked passenger train, was attached to the three intact cars of the ill-fated train, and all

the passengers hurried to Kansas City. Thirty-one of the injured are now in a hospital here.

This afternoon almost an acre of ground surrounding the scene of the wreck crumbled into the river, and tonight a large part of the big stream is flowing over the ground formerly covered by the roadbed. It will be necessary to build almost a quarter of a mile of track around the washout.

BOAT OVERLOADED, CAPSIZED AND FOUR LIVES LOST

Butte, Mont., July 25.—A special to the Miner from Billings says:

Four lives were lost this afternoon by the capsizing of a boat filled with Sons of Hermann picnicers on the Yellowstone river about a quarter of a mile above the dam of the Montana Water Power company, two miles south of this city. Among the drowned is John Stafek, a German from the city of Billings, one of the most prominent of Billings' citizens and a pioneer well known throughout Montana. Mr. Stafek was dragged down to his death by the girls who seized him when the boat overturned, and perished with him. They are Pressie West, aged 16; Minnie Wagoner, aged 17, and a child of 6 years whose name at this time is not known.

In a craft capable of safely bearing three persons, eight girls, under the guidance of Mr. Stafek, got into the boat for a ride, and when about 10 feet from the bank, the 16-year-old daughter of J. C. Bland leaned over the side of the boat, causing the overloaded craft to slip some water. This frightened the girl and, with a scream of terror, she leaped from her seat and fell into the swirling current, which quickly bore them into mid-stream. The Bland girl managed to get her head above water, and was rescued, while her young sister was pulled from the water by Joseph Fuller, a picnicer, who sprang into the river after her.

The daughter of Lewis Lehseldt had gone down for the third time, when W. J. Scott, racing along the bank with a long pole, managed to raise her body to the surface of the water and work it ashore, the child being revived after several hours of heroic work.

Seattle, Wash., July 25.—Swedish week at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition began today and will culminate next Saturday in Swedish day, with Gov. John A. Johnson of Minnesota, as the orator and central figure. The United Swedish Singers of the Pacific will hold their annual meeting at the fair all week, and will share the musical honors of Swedish day with Madame Hellstrom-Oscar, who comes direct from the royal opera in Stockholm. Thousands of Swedes from all parts of the United States will arrive in Seattle during the week, many coming in special trains.

MODERN MODEL BURGLARS' CLUB ACCIDENTALLY FOUND

Los Angeles, Cal., July 25.—When Patrolmen Bow and Browning Saturday arrested four boys whose ages range from 14 to 17 years, in a deserted shack at the corner of Blades and Winter streets, they did not know that they had unearthed anything more than a gang of youthful petty thieves, but yesterday it was discovered, the officers say, that this gang has been operating the most modern burglar's club in the city, with wireless telegraphy as one of its principal features.

Arthur Smith, 17 years of age, appeared to be the ruling spirit of the gang, and he also was the operator of the principal wireless station.

Four other stations were operated and members of the gang were kept informed of another's movements by wireless, according to the police. In fact, it was discovered that there are seven members of the gang and that Smith was able to communicate with three members after his arrest at the shack and acquaint them with the presence of the officers and permit them to hide. John Brown, aged 15, Burnett Ward, 16; Leslie Johnson, 14, were captured with Smith. All reside in the neighborhood with their parents, but it is alleged that they have been engaged in petty thievery, bicycle stealing and burglary for months. A deep pit near the central wireless station operated by Smith, contained much loot, the officers say. Smith has made a confession, it is alleged. The members of the gang will be arraigned today.

Family Had Hard Time to Get Copy Of Proceedings.

San Francisco, July 25.—In an interview printed in the Call today, Miss Daisy Sutton, a sister of Lieut. James N. Sutton, tells of the struggle of her mother to obtain a copy of the proceedings of the first investigation into the young officer's death.

Miss Sutton, who arrived in San Francisco yesterday, said:

"The night that my brother was dead, we had no suspicion that he met a violent death. When we learned later of the announcement of the naval board of inquiry that he had come to his death from a bullet wound inflicted by his own hand we were stunned. My father wrote to the naval authorities at Annapolis asking for a copy of the testimony at the inquest and received the curt notice that it would not be given us. He tried again and again.
