FOREIGN NOTES.

In Siberia, during the winter, milk is bought and sold in a frozen state, and can be carried for a long period in a simple bag. When required for use, the requisite quantity is chopped off with a hatchet or sheath knife, and thawed as needed.

The high price of coal in England is leading to the development, on an extensive scale, of coal mining in India. We learn that all the railways which have their termini in Calcutta now use Indian coal. On the rivers, also, large quantities of Bengal coal are consumed. Good coal is also reported to have been found in Assam.

The celebrated lady dentist of Berlin, Mrs. Henrietta Herschfeld, is described as a refined and beautiful woman, with wonderful strength in her small hand. She extracts teeth with unsurpassed dexterity and precision. Moreover, she prepares well-written articles for magazines, in which she instructs mothers in regard to the care of children's teeth—a matter which seems not generally understood in Germany.

The alarming spread of the foot and mouth disease in England formed the principal topic of a speech delivered by Mr. St. Aubyn, M. P., to his constituents the other day. This gentleman urged the importance of vigorous repressive measures, and quoted statistics to show that the loss in England from the disease would this year amount to between £4,000,000 and £6,000,000.

Prussian officials in the conquered provinces don't seem to appreciate French jokes. One of Emperor Bismarck's unwilling subjects was before the court in Mulhouse as a witness the other day, and was asked what language he spoke. "I speak English to my wife, French to my clients, and German to my dogs was the answer. Whereupon the judge roared, "away with him," and he went away to the guard house for forty-eight hours.

So intellect is only phosphorus on the brain, after all. At least thus reasons a Paris medico in forty quarto pages of a report to the Academy of Sciences. According to him, you have only to introduce phosphorus into the brain of an idiot and you at once transform him into a man of genius. We are not told, however, how the phosphorus is to be introduced.

Mr. Ruskin is teaching England a new science of political economy, energetically denouncing the one in vogue, the effects of which are all around us. He does not believe in supply and demand, nor free competition, nor laissez-faire, nor devil take the hindmost; but is preaching with all his eloquence a new or long forgotten gospel of honest and thorough work, fair wages, beautiful and happy homes, and no hindmost for the devil to lay hold of.

The Commissioners of Works have caused to be erected in Hyde Park, at exactly 150 yards' distance from the "Reformers' Tree," a granite pedestal and iron standard surmounted by a board to mark the spot where it shall be lawful (and there only) to hold public meetings, and inscribed with the following announcement:—"The Notice Board Respecting Public Addresses.—No public address may be delivered except within forty yards of the notice board on which this rule is inscribed." The rule is to the following effect, and is in addition posted at all the entrances to the park—"No public address may be delivered unless a written notice of the intention, signed with the names and addresses of two householders residing in the metropolis, be left at the office of her Majesty's Works and Public Buildings at least two clear days before; such notice must state the day and hour of intended delivery. After such notice has been received no other notice for the delivery of an address on the same day will be valid."

MAKE YOUR OWN BREAD.—A write in *Hearth and Home* says: There is more of the element that we call happiness arising from the use of good bread than is credited to that source. If your husband's love can grow for you and for his home under the infliction of bad bread, then he is a great man—much greater than men in general.

If you expect your children to be obedient, sweet, and respectful in their accents and behavior, with sour bread fomenting in their little stomachs, you will be disappointed unless they are very near to their angel state. Two hours' service in your kitchen making bread if you will give it your whole heart and hands, will yield you a better return than many hours spent in borrowing trouble and looking on the dark side of life, and trying to think that the very darkest side is always turned towards you. Just try the experiment of working in flour, of watching the dough rise, of moulding it into symmetrical small loaves, of peeping into the oven to see the rich brown crust over them, and the sight of the loaves when well done, and better still of the husband's exclamation, "Oh, what delicious bread!" and then see if you do not feel rewarded, even before you taste the snowy loaf. It will not hurt your hands to make bread, and it will cheer you heart.

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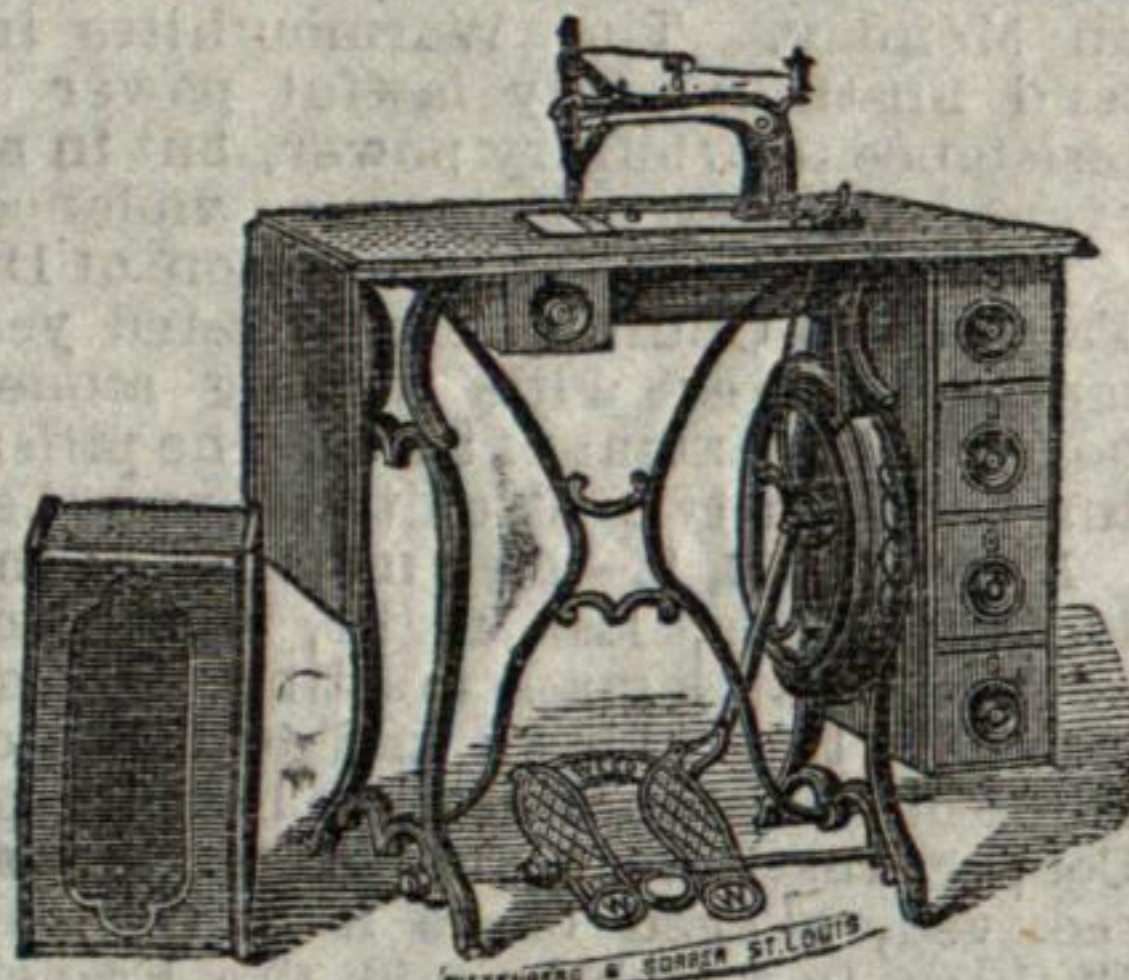
