other Professions. SEC. 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City, that all Physicians, Surgeons, Druggists, Apothecaries or other persons who prepare and put up drugs and med-icines are hereby required to label them in a plain and legible manner in the English language; and all prescriptions given by any person for drugs or medicines shall also be written in the English language,

He who cures is the best Physician. hd no drugs or medicines shall be given to any person without first explaining what they are. Neither

shall they be administered without the consent of the parties interest-SEC. 2. No person shall within the limits of this City carry on the business or profession of Physician, curgeon, Bentist, Occuliet or Aurist, without first obtaining a license therefor, Applications for license shall be made to the Mayor in writing, who is hereby authorized to is the license on the payment of one dollar.

NEC 3.—Any person neglecting by refusing to comply with the provisions of this Ordinance shall be liable to a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars, or imprisonment not to exceed six months, or ment net to exceed six months, or to both fine and imprisonment.

SEC. 4.—An Ordinance "in Relation to Drugs and Medicines," chap.

17 Revised, Ordinance, or an Ordinance Relating to Physicians, passed March 12, 1860, and all that part of "Article 87 Chap. 8, "Revised Ordinance," licensing Physicians, Surgeons, Dentists Oculists and Apriets, are hereby repealed.
