Sugar was supported below 1,12% and rose well above last night. The market became dull about last night's level, and then stiffened on the sharp break in wheat. The southwestern grangers were most benefitted. Changes in price values of the leading stocks in the second hour were narrow, but with an upward ten-dency on a light demand. Northern Pacific steel stocks which had declined sharply, recovered a point or more be-fore noon. Brooklyn Transit advanced to 54%, sugar to 1.14 and other indus-

trials to the best. When the decline was arrested the market became intensely dull and sluggish. The selling was renewed in the late dealings, carrying B. & O. down to 69.
