AFTERNOON SESSION. After receise this afternoon Senator Borah offered in evidence a decision of the supreme court of Colorado in case of Charles H Moyer, denving a wilt of habeas corpus to the president of the Western Federation of Miners. The opinion was written by Chief Justice Gabbert and was identified for the purpose of showing alleged ani-nus of the rederation against the jur-st whose life was attempted by Harry trehard. The reading of the decision the court was dispensed with for the court was dispensed with for the time being to enable the state to fill to the stand James Kirwan, act-ing secretary of the Western Federa-on of Miners in the absence of Hay-

wood. Kirwan detailed the duties of the office he now fills. He was asked about the membership of the execu-tive board in different years, the ob-fect being to show that "Jack" Simp-kins, implicated by Orchard in the first attempt upon Gov. Steunenberg, was a member of the board in 1904, 1905 and 1906. Kirwan said this was true. He said the president and sec-rclary-treasurer are ex-officio memrelaty treasurer are ex-officio mem-bers of the board. Money from the tracsury of the organization is paid out on order of the president and secreary-treasurer.

This was all that was desired of Mr. Kirwan and he was released without cross-examination. A TALK WITH HAYWOOD. E. M. Stuart, a machinist of Baker City, Oregon, formerly chief engineer of the Trade Dollar mine at Silver City, was called to testify as to a conversa-tion he had with Haywood in 159. MAY BE NEW EVIDENCE. Boise, Ida., June 20.-41 was stated tonight that the prosecution had re-ceived a telegram from Denver showing that the date on the draft for \$109, sent by William Haywood to Jack Simpkins, was Feb. 21, 1905. Orchard testified that when Simpkins left Cald-well, after the failure of the first at-tempt on the life of Frank Steumen-berg, he asked him to get \$100 for him. The unsigned letter which Orchard got at Caldwell, after his arrest, and which he said was written by George Petti-bone, one of the co-defendants, in-formed him that "that" had been sent to "Jack" on Dec. 21, 1905, and that he should have received it.
