being used to this, have built large fires in their copious fire-places and have taken refuge near the same; their houses not having been built for a cold climate cause them to hover closely around the hearth-stone. The large fire by which I am sitting has burned to coals and the embers upon each side are in a smouldering condition, while midnight silence reigns supreme, making all in all a pleasant place to write, but before I proceed I must not forget to wish you, with all the saints, "A Happy New Year."

My last was dated April 12th, at which time I was traveling alone, in which way I traveled till October 18th. During that time I held a good many meetings, made many friends and had the pleasure of baptizing two into the bonds of the covenant.

On October 18th, I met Elders Robertson, Wilcox and McClenahan, three sturdy sons of Zion, who had come to assist me in my missionary labors. They were all strangers to each other before leaving Salt Lake City, and on their arrival were all strangers to me, but it was not long before we were acquainted. I was more than pleased at meeting them. No one but those who have been in a similar situation can realize the joyful feelings of a missionary when he meets with brethren after long separation.

After introducing Brother Robertson and Wilcox to many friends in Lamar County, Alabama, Brother McClenahan and myself took a trip to Loundes County, Mississippi, where we sowed some good seed and returned to Lamar for our mail, expecting to visit Loundes again immediately, but it rained and kept raining, till the water courses were raised and we were unable to do so. While we were waiting for the creeks and rivers to get down, so we could travel, we received word that we were wanted near Mormon Springs, Monroe County, Mississippi. We repaired thither immediately and met Brother James Dale, who went to Utah in '65, there joined the Church, remained four years and returned to this country to see his folks. He told me that he had not apostatized, but had held fast to the faith and intended to return to Utah next fall, for which trip he is now making preparations.

Bro. Dale had sent for us: several times and had told his neighbors that we would be there to preach at his house, so the first thing wanted was a meeting. One was appointed for the next evening, Dec. 9, at which I delivered a discourse from Acts 17, 26-28, to a large and attentive audience. After meeting several said that I preached the first sermon they had ever heard, and it was what they had been seeking all their lives. Since that we have preached seven times, visited a number of families and have invitations to visit about a dozen more. We believe that we have found some of the seed of Israel. We have heard men say they believed and had repented, who also expressed a determination to be one with the Saints of God. So, to judge from appearances, we have opened a good field here, and in it we have a large work to perform.

Probably you would be pleased to learn why this place is called Mormon Springs. It is where the "Mormons" had a large branch of the Church upwards of 30 years ago, and it has been known by that name ever since. Here allow me to say that much good seed, which was sown here by the Elders in those times and since, is still to be found in the hearts of the people. Likewise where there has been one bad seed planted the Elders have to tread upon the thorns and thistles of it to-day. But I do not think there have been many of the latter sown in this district.

This season has been the wettest the "old settlers" have ever seen, I have not seen a week of dry weather for over four months. Many people have not got their cotton out of the fields. Wheat was a failure last summer.

It will be well for those who buy calicos, etc., to purchase before next spring, what they will need for two succeeding years, for the cotton raised this year is of no account.

The publication of my letter in the News concerning the Cypress, caused orders to pour in like rain. I do not believe I will be able to fill all of them fully for want of seed. If half of the seeds grow which I have sent, there will be several forests of Cypress in Utah.

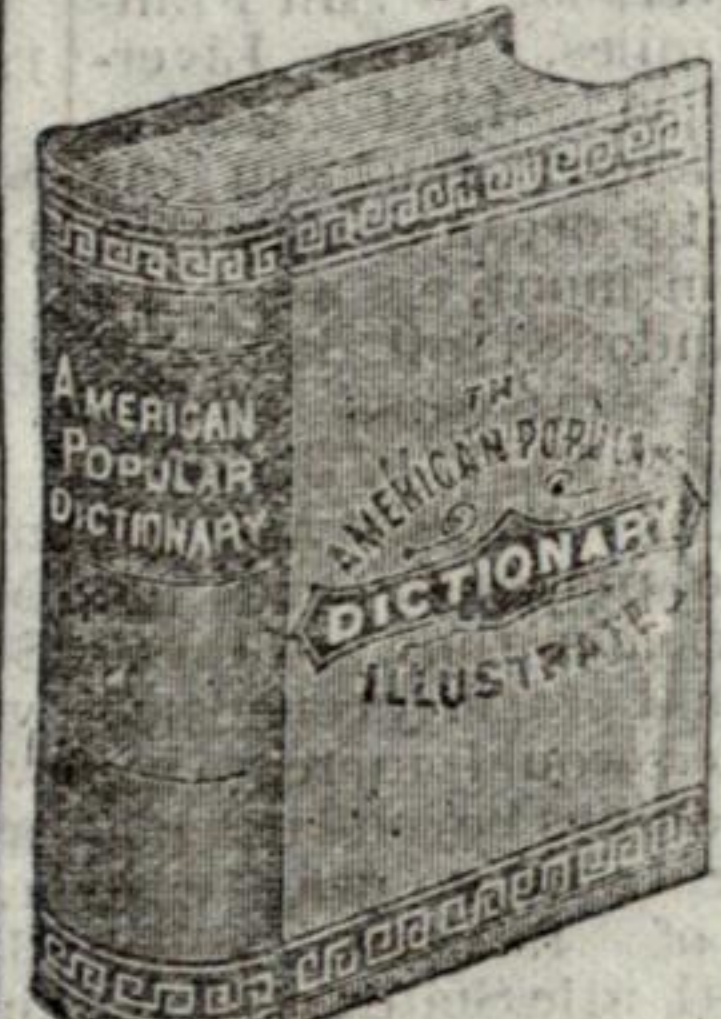
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
