AN ITALIAN SHIP CANAL.

Tuis is the age of canals. That is, water ways made artificially for the passage of ships to carry the commerce of the world. We need not refer to the great projects of this character which have been completed r are under way. But a new scheme has just been devised for a canal on the western shore of the Italian peninsula, from the western shore just above Civita Vecchia at Castre, through to Fano on the eastern or Adriatic

On the route are two bodies of water, Bolsena and Trasimeno lakes. It is proposed to drain these and open the

land thus redeemed to cultivation. According to the London Figuro the length of the canal will be about 169 miles, the width of it 110 yards, and its depth about 13 yards, so that ships of any tonnage, and even men-bi-war, will be able to pass through it. The cost of the canal is reckoned at 500,-000,000 francs, that is \$100,000,000. It is estimated that the work could be completed in five years from its commencement. The Italian journais are highly interested in the project and are. taking up the matter warmly, and when the fact of the long sea passage round the south coast of Italy and up
