BILL TO RESTRAIN ISSUING OF INJUNCTIONS

Washington, Dec. 12.-A bill designed to restrain the United States circuit and district courts and judges from issulng temporary Injunctions against the operation of the state laws was introduced in the house today by Mr. Clayton of Alabama. The bill provides that it shall be unlawful for any circult or district court, or any circuit or cuit or district court, or any vircuit or district judge of the United States to Issue any injuncton restraining the execution of any state law, except in cases where final trial has been had or final decree of judgment has been rendered, declaring that such state law to be in violation of the Constitution, faws or treaties of the United States.

No injunction is to issue against any state officer or other person in any case except where final judgment has been rendered holding the state law to be contrary to the Constitution, laws or treaties of the United States.
