UNITED EFFORT FOR GOOD ROADS

Campaign Motto is "Agitation, Education, Organization and Legislation."

BIG CONVENTION EXPECTED.

Invitations Should be Readily Responded to, That Movement May Become General.

For some years there has been a decided interest in Utah with reference to the improvements of the public roads. The system established in the first formation of this state, included state roads of good width and reaching central points, which roads have been laid out and in some places have been well improved. Throughout the state there have been various methods used in securing the improvement of the public highways. Some have been successful, many have been failures. Certain it is that nature has been very lavish of material in the mountains which bound the fertile valleys and plains. It is a matter of utmost importance that this general interest should be crystallized into permanent organization for good roads. Accordingly, under the proclamation of the governor, a state convention has been called in Salt Lake City, Friday and Saturday, June 2 and 3, in which proclamation each county is urged to send to the capital a number of delegates. The convention will be held under the auspices of the National Good Roads association, which is operating very extensively throughout the country, already in some 35 states. Organization in part, if not in whole, has been effected in many states, and this year its status is well in hand. The official National Good Roads special left Chicago Thursday, May 25th, on route for Portland, Oregon, where the great Pacific Coast National Good Roads convention will be held June 22, 23, and 24, in conjunction with the Lewis-Clark Centennial Exposition. The exposition directors have designated June 24 as "Good Roads Day" and already many governors have appointed delegates, and in some instances will attend the convention with their staffs. Upwards of 40 governors are connected with the national good roads movement, either on the advisory committee or as acting vice presidents. Some 2,000 cities in the United States are co-operating with the good roads movement for the betterment of local conditions in civic improvement and for good country roads.

FOR UNITED EFFORT.

The central committee of Salt Lake City has sent out invitations throughout the state and everything will be done to make the convention a notable one both for the agitation and education of the people and for a strong organization which will co-operate with local road officials, and work for further legislation which will aid Utah to secure good roads.

State aid in New York has become so popular that in November of this year an amendment is to be voted upon appropriating \$5,000,000 for the improvement of the public roads in that state. Other states following the state aid plan are Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, California and Louisiana. There is also great interest in the good roads movement in the southern states. In fact, the cities which are attracting the most capital for investment and factories are cities which are legislating for a system of good roads.

The National Good Roads association will be represented in Salt Lake City by its officials and the convention will be held for two days, June 2 and 3, three sessions the first day, 10 a. m., 2 p. m. and 8 p. m., and two sessions on the last day. Meetings will be held in the Assembly hall, the courtesy for the use of which has been extended by Bishop Prentiss.

Col. W. H. Moore, president of the National Good Roads association, will bring on a special corps of experts and road builders, together with men of national reputation.
