Startling Features Brought Out in Superintendent Allison's

Report.

Superintendent Allison last night made a report to the board of educaoomosg?aueKenzie oeo xzfiffffffffffff t tion, giving valuable and interesting statistics showing the number of pupils by schools in each grade, and the average ages of the pupils in the varjous grades. A rather startling feature brought out in the report is that the average pupil does not get beyond the fifth grade, there being more in that grade than in any other. From the ifth grade up the number of pupils. steadily diminishes. The board may investigate further some of the conditions shown by the statistics, with a view to checking any harmful tenden cles such as too rapid or too slow pro-motion, as it is shown that in some of the schools the promotions are made nuch younger than in others. The report deals with 3,810 pupils en-

rolled in the grade schools and 410 pupils in the high school, and the average age at which then enter that institution udging from the present first year class-is about 15 years. The average age of graduation-judging from the present senior class is about 18.2. The tatistics of the various grades are as allow's.

MEAT FOR FOULTRY.

Most poultrymen who have experi-mented with feeding meat to poultry are well pleased with the results and find that the practise pays in egg produc-tion and in the increased thriftiness of the fowls. Those who have had reason to complain of the results are those who have red it in a carcless manner and allowed some of the hens to gorge them-velves with it while others were denrived selves with it while others were deprive of their share. An exclusive or almost exclusive meat diet is inclined to mak of their share. An exclusive or almost exclusive meat diet is inclined to make fewls lazy and sluggish, and the amount fed to them should be intelligently regu-lated and always fed in connection with other feed. The amount of ment usually fed by the most experienced poultry rais-ers is about five pounds for every 500 hens, and in that ratio for any greater or less number. If the hens are fed milk in any considerable quantity the amount of meat should be somewhat lessened. Cut hay is a good ration to feed in con-nection with meat, and this supplemented with a moderate amount of grain. The latter should always be fed to them scat-tered in fitter so that they will be com-pelled to scratch, as it is my experience that hens fed on a meat diet need more exercise than if they were subsisting on other feed. other feed.
