away. His funeral will take place at Washington, Georgia, Thursday morn ing at 11:30 o'elock; Robert Toombs was born in Wash-ington, Wilkes County, Georgia, July

, 1810, and was therefore in his 76th year at the time of his death. He was graduated at Union College, Schenectady, in 1828, studied law at the Uni-versity of Virginia, and commenced practice at his native place. In 1836 he served under Gen. Scott as captain of volunteers, in the Creek war. In 1837 he was electedito the Georgia Legislatare and was continued in that office till 1844, with the exception of the year 1841. From 1845 to 1853 he was a mem-

ber of the United States Senate, being re-elected for the term ending March 1865. He was a prominent member of the extreme Southern rebels and was one of the most active in per-suading Georgia to secede.
