CHOLERA IN JAPAN.

A PAPER published in Japan states that there had up to July 25th, occurred in that country, 1001 cases of cholera, 471 of which had proved fatal. On the 24th, 76 new cases and 34 deaths were reported in Nagasaki and district. Twelve seamen on the Turkish frigate Erbougroul, in Yokohama harbor, succumbed to the disease, which was caused by two liberal indulgence in Japanese lemonade, raw fruit and ice.

It may, perhaps, be well to remember that our western coast is more or less endangered by the epidemic in Asia, owing to the lively traffic between the two continents across the Pacific Oceau. The danger is imminent enough to call for the greatest vigilance on the part of the authorities in keeping the dreaded guest away from our shores.

Cleanliness is the best preventive. It has been pretty well demonstrated that the cholera bacillus is not very dangerous in localities where the air is pure and every-thing is kept clean. The little animais that cause the epidemic need a contaminated air in which to develop their destructive powers. Without this medium of transmittal they are comparatively harm-
