

stop to this system of emigration as the Irish American has. Every body looks upon this thing as an anomaly that should not be tolerated by the American people.

The President replied as follows: "The subject you present will receive my most careful consideration. It has already been under consideration by the Secretary of State. Correspondence in regard to it has been had with our diplomatic and consular representatives, and an investigation of the facts is now being made. It is of course proper to state that this Government should ascertain whether any nation with which it holds amicable relations is violating any obligation of International Friendship, before calling attention to any such matter. In the meantime, the law now provides that the officers of the Treasury shall examine into the condition of passengers arriving as immigrants in any port of the United States, and if there should be found any convict, lunatic, idiot, or any person unable to take care of himself without becoming a public charge, they shall report the same to the President by the collector of such port, and such person shall not be permitted to land. The investigation shall be thorough and exhaustive on this side of the Atlantic." Each of the delegates was then presented to the President by Sullivan, and the Conference closed. Secretary Teller received copies of the published dispatches from General Schofield and regarding the treatment of the Apache captives. The Secretary will insist that these Indians be kept off the San Carlos reservation, and he says Secretary Lincoln will co-operate with him. Secretary Teller will leave Washington for Chicago to-night to be absent about a week.

Hon. Montgomery Blair is lying dangerously ill in his summer residence near Silver Springs, Maryland.

The case of Wilson vs. Gabriel, involving title to land in San Francisco, is decided in Gabriel's favor.

It was supposed the Presidential order consolidating internal revenue collection districts would be issued to-day, but the clerical labor of reducing the scheme to writing was greater than anticipated, and it was not ready to be submitted to the President until late in the afternoon. In the meantime some considerations had been offered that seemed to make some change needful, and the issuance of the order has been deferred until Monday.

J. F. Brady to-day gave bail in \$20,000 under the new indictments. Second Assistant Postmaster General Elmer has annulled the contract of John R. Miner to carry the mail upon the Niobrara route.

WASHINGTON, 25.—General Crook has been ordered here by the Secretary of War for consultation as to the final disposition of the captured Apaches. The War Department has received no official information of the arrival of the captives at San Carlos, and no instructions to send them here have been sent to General Crook.

SARATOGA, 25.—John S. Stryker, a well known New York millionaire, was drowned in Saratoga Lake while bathing. He leaves a bride of two months.

FOREIGN.

LONDON, 21.—The Empress of Germany has written Queen Victoria, expressing deep sympathy with the sufferers by the disaster at the children's entertainment at Sunderland on Saturday.

The steamer Nevada, from Queenstown for New York, has 671 Mormons, 800 Scandinavians, the remainder British.

The government announces its intention to abandon the criminal proceedings bill at the present session.

The British North Borneo Company officially deny that the staff of the company was massacred by natives of Borneo.

Lord Randolph Churchill, in a written communication to Gladstone, states that he would hand over to the latter a historical memorandum proving the Khedive's complicity in the massacre at Alexandria. The Prime Minister would promise a full inquiry. Gladstone replied if any step was taken the government might have to take possession of the Khedive, the ruler of Egypt, which would be suspiciously regarded. Churchill, in a second communication, states that he will forward to Gladstone an indictment of the Khedive on the charge of being the real author of the massacre, and that he (Lord Randolph) will be prepared to

co-operate to the utmost extent of his resources in bringing up such witnesses as may be necessary to prove the truth of his statements in this particular.

Dublin, 21.—In the inquiry now in progress at Mullingar, in connection with the murder of Mrs. Smythe, on April 22d, an informer testified that an assassination society had been started by Michael and John Fagan, with the object of removing bad landlords. Among those named by the society for removal were two gentlemen named Smythe, living in County Langford, and two of the prisoners were deputed to execute the sentence.

The prisoners charged with complicity in the murder of Mrs. Smythe were present at a meeting held March, 1882, outside the house of the mother of the Fagans.

The Irish Times says the government gave James Carey, informer, the option of proceeding to one of the British colonies or being released and allowed to remain in Dublin without police protection.

LONDON, 22.—Queen Victoria has left Balmoral for Windsor.

At the wool sales to-day, 67,000 bales of Port Philip and Sidney wool were sold. The series of sales closed with a firm feeling. During all the sales better kinds were dearer than they were in March. Crossbred and faulty kinds easier.

The Malagasy envoys do not credit the rumor of the death of Queen Ronavolo.

Dublin, 22.—A militiaman named Ryan, about to start for America, was arrested at Tuam, on the charge of being connected with the murder of Justice Young, shot five years ago.

LONDON, 23.—In the trial yesterday at Nyregheza, Hungary, of Jews accused of having murdered a Christian girl and used her blood to mix their Passover bread, the only clear evidence adduced tended strongly to establish an alibi in favor of Buxbaum, the Jewish butcher. Witnesses for the prosecution contradicted each other and also their own former statements. The audience in the court openly threatened witness for the defense with punishment. The public prosecutor, in consequence of the disorder in court, declared he would propose the most stringent measures for the preservation of order unless the president stopped the disturbances. The Times correspondent believes the boy Moritz Scharf, the principal witness for the prosecution, is a fanatic.

Dublin, 23.—A report is current that James Carey, informer, has gone to the north of Ireland, and that the Government will eventually send him to Canada.

Glasgow, 23.—The new steamer Oregon, built for the Gulon line, to run between New York and Liverpool, was launched to-day.

Shanghai, 24.—It is stated that a telegram couched in language of a very pacific nature has been received from France. It is believed to be due to the efforts of Marquis Teng. A report was received here of an outbreak of trouble between the French and their native allies in Anam. M. Triecon, the French minister to China remains here.

Marquis Teng denies that any agreement has been reached between the French minister at Shanghai and the Chinese commander.

The Marquis reaffirms his statement that Chinese troops are massing on the borders of Tonquin, and says that China will not accept any Franco-Anam treaty that is opposed to her sovereign rights in Anam. Marquis Teng is anxious to obtain England's good offices.

Stettin, 24.—The German government refuses to allow men belonging to Germany to take to China the Chinese ironclad recently launched here.

LONDON, 24.—A dispatch reports many incendiary fires in Kungur, government of Perin, Russia, and that several persons have been arrested on suspicion of having started fires.

LONDON, 25.—The Queen's condition is greatly improved. Her Majesty walked from the train to the carriage on her arrival at Windsor from Balmoral. The Queen invited the painter Angell, to England, to take a life-sized portrait, which she will present to Emperor William, on the 25th anniversary of his assumption of the regency of Prussia.

The Duke of Connaught to-day opened the Irish Lace Exhibition at the Mansion House. He expressed the hope that the exhibition would lead to the extension of the lace industry and prosperity of Ireland.

LONDON, 25.—Intelligence of a frightful calamity at a place of amusement in Dervio, on the shore

of Lake Como, has just been received. While a performance was in progress at the Puppet Theatre, that structure took fire and was entirely destroyed. Forty-seven persons lost their lives and twelve others were injured.

Dublin, 25.—A terrible affray occurred at Curragh last evening, between a party of County Mayo military and some English soldiers; five were killed.

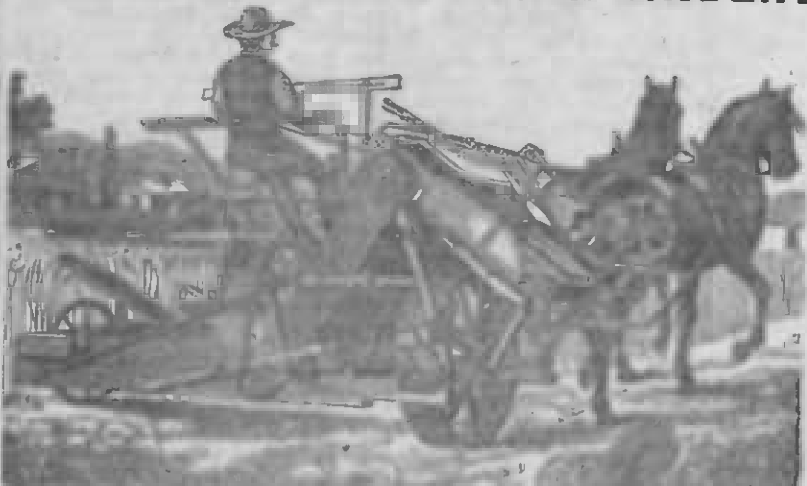
