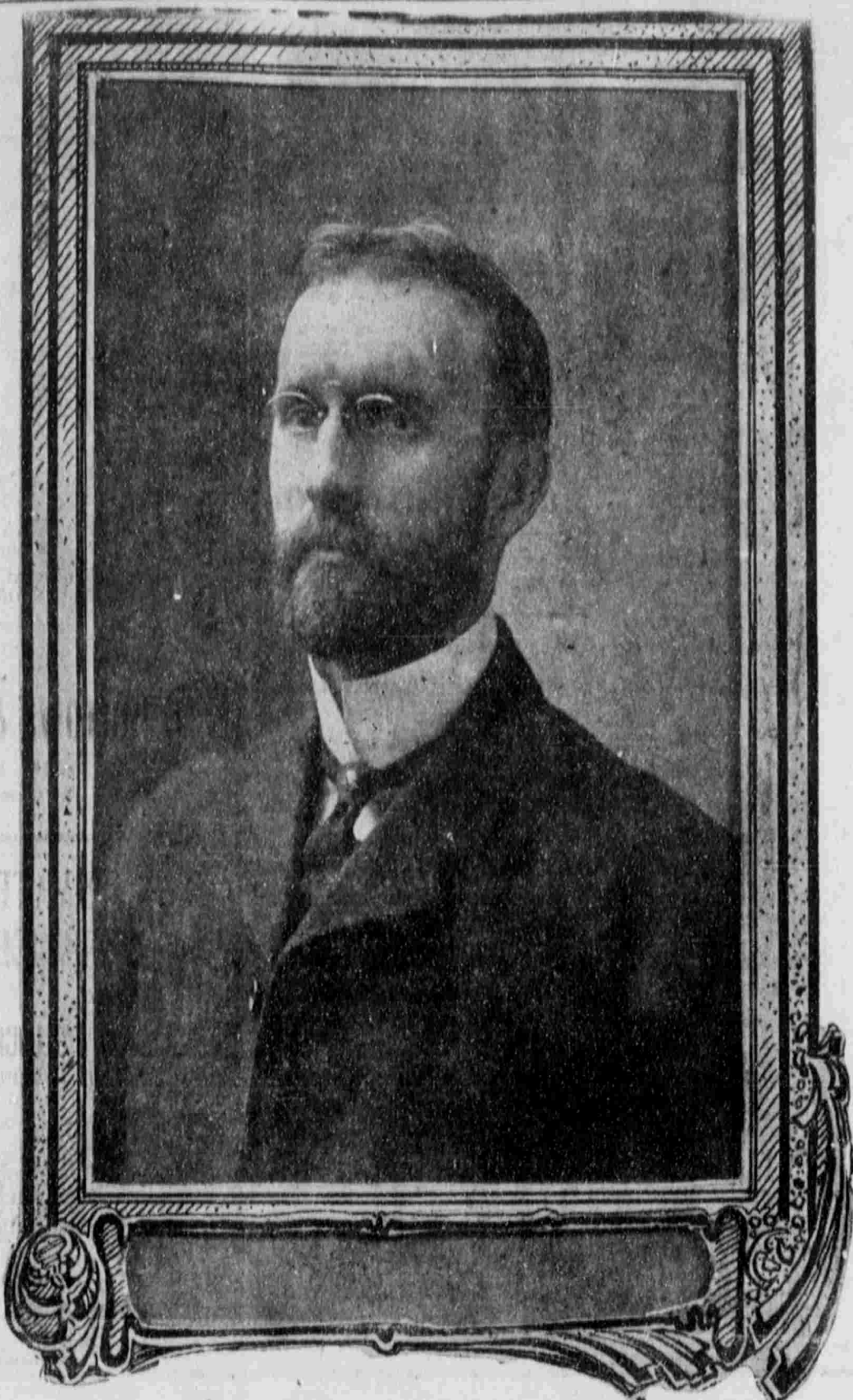

HON. GEORGE SUTHERLAND.

Whose name will be presented to the Legislature next month for the position of United States Senator from Utah.

Interesting and fascinating always to the people of a state is the reading of the lives and achievements of her sons, who, chosen to positions of honor and trust, have discharged their duties capably and conscientiously. In this class, it can be said without flattery, the subject of this sketch belongs. Hon. George Sutherland was born in Buckingham, England, March 25, 1862. At the age of two he crossed the Atlantic and came to the Rocky mountains. Until the age of 10 he lived at Springville in Utah county, his father at that time being engaged in mining and trading, taking supplies from Utah to Virginia City, then the great mining town of Montana. In 1872 George went with his parents to Silver City, Tintic, which was his home during the next six years, with the exception of two years—1874-1876—when he was employed in the clothing business at Salt Lake City.

In 1878 he took up his residence at Provo within almost a stone's throw of his old home at Springville. Ambitious for an education, he looked about for the first available advantages in that line and found them in the Brigham Young academy, then recently established and now the leading institution of higher education south of Utah's capital.

While not connected with the dominant Church, whose leading spirits had founded the academy, he was on the friendliest terms with the Mormon preceptors and fellow students, who in turn respected and admired him. After completing the course at the Brigham Young academy, Mr. Sutherland read law at the University of Michigan, and was admitted to practice in the supreme court of that state in 1883. Immediately thereafter he returned to Utah and began practicing his profession at Provo, where he continued to reside until 1893. He was married in June, 1883, to Miss Rosamond Lee, a beautiful and accomplished young lady, a native of Utah. At the time Utah entered the Union, Mr. Sutherland was elect-

ed to the State senate, and served as chairman of the senate judiciary committee. In 1900 when the people of Utah were to select a congress, Sutherland's name was mentioned. Over his protest he was nominated by the state convention, which met at Provo, and was elected. While in the House of Representatives he was a member of the irrigation committee and helped to frame the irrigation law, so important to the west. He declined a renomination to Congress in 1902, and at the expiration of his term of office resumed the practice of his profession. In 1904 Mr. Sutherland went to Chicago as a delegate to the National Republican convention, which nominated Theodore Roosevelt to the presidency. Mr. Sutherland is at present senior member of the firm of Sutherland, Van Cott and Allison, one of the leading law firms of the state. The balloting in the Legislature for United States senator to succeed Senator Kearns, will begin on Tuesday, Jan. 17, 1905, and Mr. Sutherland's friends are predicting that he will be far in the lead, even if he is not chosen on the first ballot.

A DOUBLE SHOOTING.

Will Result in One Death and One Permanent Injury.

Bakersfield, Cal., Dec. 16.—A double shooting took place tonight in Kern City, that will result in the death of one person and permanent injury of another. Louis Landress, a bartender employed in the Hunter saloon, while in a jealous rage at the attentions given to his wife by Frank Z. Smith, drew a revolver, and after firing twice at the woman, pressed the muzzle of the weapon against his forehead and fired. The bullet passed upward through the skull and entered the brain. One of the shots fired at Mrs. Landress injured her right eye.

Well Known Resident of Provo Succumbs to Ptomaine Poisoning.

(Special, Salt Lake City)

Provo, Dec. 17.—George A. Hickman, a well known citizen of this place, died from what is believed to be ptomaine poisoning, at 11 o'clock last night. He had been ill during the day, and seriously so after 5 o'clock at night.

Hickman was 42 years of age, and came to Utah from Birmingham, England, three years ago. He leaves four children. Funeral services will be held Sunday in the Sixth ward chapel.
