In view of the changes which are taking place in governments, in view of -the new In governments, in view of the new doctrines which are being advanced of a socialistic character. I think that is one of the most important things to emphasize with reference to the United States. "I do not mean to say that we are

the other progressive in the sense that we do not intend to keep up with the procession in a develop-ment which shall work more and more justice to all; but I do mean to say that the long continued training of a people in self covernment is corto say that the long continued training of a people in self government is cer-tain to produce a conservatism that cannot be expected in a people that are newly come to self-government and who suffer more violent reactions on that account. Not that we are perfec-in the United States; not that we don't need a great many reforms. I can mention one that always comes to my mind, and that is the necessity of re-form in the administration of the crim-nial law. But when you look back and see the progress that we have made in

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many directions, I think we may con-gratulate ourselves in living in an age in which we are making progress, in which the people are more sensitive than they ever were before to the criti-cisms that we are not holding our-selves up to the right ideals. There will come undoubtedly as our country becomes more and more populated, as others press upon us, the necessity for the conservation of our resources, there will come a test of the practical opera-tion of our system of state and national governments.

"And it will doubtless be found that at times that system does not work as well to accomplish the economies we are after as a system as the fed-eral government has much more power, and it may be that in some directions it will be found necessary to enlarge somewhat the central power but I have an abiding faith in the Constitution of the United States as it is (applause); marvelously framed by that body of patriots and lawyers and statesmen, in simple language, bearing an elastic construction to meet conditions that they in their wildest imlagination, coud not have foreseen. And there-fore, while in some comparatively un-important matters we may have to change that relation, I feel certain that the Constitution as it is will fur-nish to us the instrument of continu-ing the growth of the Unied States in the right direction towards our high-est ideals and permit us still to main-tain that system, difficult for others to understand, but which we ourselves love, that indestructible upion of in-destructible states."

## BAKING POWDER.

Ex-Secy of War Wright Argues is Not

Subject to Pure Food Law. Washington, July 7.—Among II, many knotty problems of vital interest to the housewife which the pure food and drug board of the department of ugriculture has been called upon 1. solve, is one as to whether the effect of alum of various kinds and alum-inum salts is injurious to health. At a hearing today to representatives co-pickle and baking power manufactur-ers, Luke E. Wright, former secretary of war, made an exhaustive argument in support of the proposition that baking powder per se was not subject to the provisions of the pure food and drug act. He contended that inas-much as baking powder was not used for food the law would not apply. The term "food" in the pure food law is restricted to those substances which are used for food, but the de-partment always has construed this section to embrace food and substance; which enter into the composition of food.
