

## WOOL MONEY FROM UTAH CLIP.

It is Coming in From Sheepmen  
And Being Deposited in  
Local Banks.

WITH HOUSE AND LOT MEN.

Utah Lumber Orders Side-Track by  
Northwestern Mills for Urgent  
San Francisco Orders.

General trade conditions in this city  
for the past week show an improvement  
over those of the week previous.

The money market continues to in-  
crease in easiness with an influx of  
money from the sale of wool. This money  
is being freely deposited by the sheep  
growers, and as good prices have been  
secured, that industry is regarded as  
in a satisfactory condition.

The Zion's Savings Bank & Trust  
company disposed of seven small parcels  
of property the past week which  
brought the bank \$10,000; and the Utah  
Savings Bank & Trust company finally  
decided on a seven-story building for  
its new home, the building and the  
site representing \$175,000. The bank  
clearings have got down onto a more  
strictly balance settling basis, and the  
daily difference between the clearings  
of the present week and those of the  
same week a year ago is by no means  
as marked as last winter. The present  
manager of the Clearing House shortly  
after his appointment, intimated that  
there would be long less carrying  
over of balances and the present fig-  
ures would indicate that he has kept  
his word.

### REALTY, RENTS AND BUILDINGS.

The real estate men report many un-  
completed sales which they anticipate  
will be closed up. But owners are slow  
in many cases in clinching bargains, so  
that it takes time, and on occasions  
much weariness have been built in the  
city. While there is a lively demand for  
rented houses, there are so many in pro-  
cess of erection that the chances are  
good for a full supply in the next 60  
days, and any one who wants a good  
house need not be to any great stress  
because of any supposed stringency.  
Real estate men estimate that nearly  
4,000 dwellings have been built in this  
city in the last two years. The great-  
est call is for houses of four to six  
rooms at rentals of from \$15 to \$20 per  
month. There is a strong demand for  
store room, and desirable locations are  
snapped up as fast as they become  
empty.

### FRISCO OVER UTAH.

The lumber men regard the situation  
rather dubiously. They say the north-  
western mills have given the San  
Francisco trade the preference over  
all other calls, no matter what the  
prior filling of the orders may have  
been, and have given their agents in  
this city notice to take no more or-  
ders. Then the lumber men have been  
impacted by the scarcity of cars which  
are called off into other carrying lines.  
The result is that the scarcity which is  
usually felt towards the end of the  
building season, is beginning to be felt  
now in the wholesale trade, and lumber  
is going to be harder to get this  
year than ever. However, the local  
yards are pretty well stacked up, so  
that it will be some time before the  
retail trade is affected.

### DEMAND GOOD HERE.

The hardware men appear to be the  
most jubilant of any of the tradesmen  
this week; and report heavy demands  
from all sides and for all kinds of  
things. The demand is particularly  
heavy in harnesses, scrapers and  
leading materials. The harness de-  
mands all over the western country  
have now opened up their spring work  
in full on the return of settled and  
open spring weather, and the farmers  
having completed their early spring  
work, are now letting part of their  
team equipments out for grade and  
canal work, which occasions the ex-  
tended demand for harnesses and  
leading goods. The harness men  
find it hard work to supply the un-  
usual demand for these two classes  
of goods, and the saddlery depart-  
ments are running on more than full  
time.

### IN DRY GOODS STORES.

The dry goods men report a gratify-  
ing condition in the trade which has  
picked up wonderfully during the past  
week, on account of the clear, fine  
weather, and the ladies are flocking  
into the stores to purchase gloves,  
waists, suits, hats, underwear, para-  
sols, perfumery, hosiery, etc., so that  
the dress and sundry articles of fe-  
male apparel are being disposed of  
in large and profitable lots. The trade  
in hats is particularly of large dimen-  
sions, and the fact that prices in this  
line are always low, does not seem to  
make any difference. So the clerks  
and salespeople are busy all day,  
where in past weeks they have had  
little to do of a morning.

### MANY BUYING SHOES.

The shoe market is reported in a bet-  
ter condition perhaps than ever before.  
The retailers are active in meeting  
the steady demand, and find a ready  
sale for shiny goods with dull finished  
goods a close second. Then the busi-  
ness in canvas goods is beginning to  
show up. The making of spring goods  
is now being completed over the city,  
point to a busy autumn trade for the  
wholesale trade.

Eastern jobbers are well cleaned out  
of spring and summer goods. Dealers  
report that the high cost of leather is  
uniting the interests of the shoe trade  
in a gratifying way, as the manufac-  
turers are controlled by the cost of  
making, so that their prices are fixed,  
price cutting is rare.

The popular shoe of the day is the  
Oxford, in russet and in plain and pat-  
tern black leathers, and the demand will  
be greater as the season advances. Shoe  
shipments west from the Boston mar-  
ket have been very heavy of late.

### BUSY IN CLOTHING LINE.

The clothing, men's wear and hat  
trades have also been doing a good  
business this week; much better than  
last, two weeks during which trade  
seemed to have taken a sudden slump,  
owing to the completion over the San  
Francisco disaster. The clothing stores

and dealers say this is the time of year

magazine trade begins to fall off early

people do a great amount of reading;  
but as soon as the pleasant sunny

ple have other things to think of.

### BOARD HAS AUTHORITY.

May Make Appropriations to Defray  
Expenses for Investigations.

Attorney General Breiden gave out  
the following opinion yesterday after-  
noon to Secretary Dixon of the state  
land board stating that the board has  
authority to appropriate money with  
which to defray expenses for investigat-  
ing reservoir sites:  
"I beg to acknowledge the receipt of  
your favor of the 9th inst., in which you  
desire to be advised 'as to whether  
the state board of land commissioners  
has authority under the law to ap-  
propriate moneys out of the reservoir  
fund for the payment of the cost of in-  
vestigating reservoir sites, and the pre-  
liminary work necessary to determine  
the feasibility of constructing a reser-  
voir.'"  
In replying to the foregoing I beg to  
direct your attention to the provisions  
of chapter 50, session laws of 1901, sec-  
tion 2, as amended by chapter 48, ses-  
sion laws of 1905, which authorities and  
directs the state board of land com-  
missioners to cause the construction of reser-  
voirs and cause to be constructed suit-  
able reservoirs for the purpose of storing  
water to be supplied to state lands  
and other lands whenever in its judg-  
ment the interest of the state would be  
promoted thereby.

It will be observed that by the lan-  
guage of section 2 as amended the state  
board of land commissioners is not  
only authorized to make selection of  
sites and to construct reservoirs, but  
the law directs said board to act affir-  
matively that is to say, it is made  
mandatory upon the board to make  
such selections and construct reservoirs  
when in its judgment the interest of  
the state would be promoted. In order  
for the board to act intelligently and  
for the best interests of the state there  
must of necessity be investigation and  
preliminary work.

This cannot be accomplished without  
expense, and in my opinion the action  
referred to necessarily carries with it  
authority for the appropriation of the  
necessary funds to carry out and to  
put into operation the purposes of the  
Legislature in enacting this law. Re-  
ferring to chapter 120, session laws of  
1905, referred to in your communica-  
tion, providing for the encouragement  
of reservoir projects, the selection of  
two of the most feasible reservoir sites,  
the preparation of data, etc., you are  
advised that this entire chapter was re-  
pealed by chapter 126, laws of 1905, and  
therefore is no part of the laws of this  
state.

It is not necessary to discuss this  
question at greater length, and you are  
now advised that the state board of  
land commissioners is authorized to ap-  
propriate and expend the necessary  
funds, out of the reservoir fund, for the  
preliminary work in selecting and locat-  
ing suitable sites for reservoirs, etc.

## BUSINESS HORIZON IS CLEARING UP.

Coal Strike Settlement Improves  
Domestic Industrial  
Conditions.

CROP OUTLOOK UNCERTAIN.

Keeps Quotations for Staples High—  
Big Increase in Railway  
Earnings.

New York, May 11.—R. G. Dunn &  
Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade tomor-  
row will say:

"Domestic industrial conditions are  
greatly improved by the anthracite coal  
settlement and the resumption of traffic  
on the lakes, while the international  
situation is much brighter now than  
the French elections have passed with-  
out a serious outbreak. This element  
of uncertainty as to the crops tends to  
maintain quotations of staples at a high  
position. Dunn's index number of com-  
modity prices on May 1 was 100.659,  
against 100.666 six months previous, the  
slight decline being supplied by dairy  
and garden products, but compared  
with the level of all quotations a  
year ago there is an advance of 8.7  
per cent.

"Railway earnings thus far available  
for April show a gain of 8.7 per cent  
over the previous year, and foreign  
commerce at this port for the last week  
exhibits gains of 4,526,277 in exports  
and 428,538 in imports, as compared  
with the same week in 1905.

"Failures this week were 209 in the  
United States, against 197 last week,  
and 17 in Canada, compared with 21 a  
year ago."

London, May 11.—The inquest today  
on the body of Maj. John Nicholas

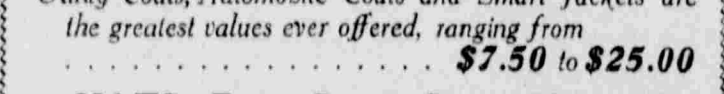
