CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

Next House officers—Bills called up.

Wilson, from the committee on military affairs, reported and advocated an amendment appropriating \$200,000 for making and testing the a coast rifle gun upon a plan recommended by a board of army officers and approved by the chief of ordnance and the Secretary of War. Tabled.

Stewart offered an amendment relating the meaning of section of the act of July 20, 1864, and directing the Secretary of the Treasury to pay over to the Pacific Railroad Company one half the compensation for services which have been or shall be rendered by either of said Pacific Railroad Companies for the United States. Stewart said he reported the amendments from the Judiciary committee, by their direction.

Edwards, a member of the Judiciary committee, denied that the committee had ever considered the amendment, and appealed to Trumbull, chairman of the committee, who endorsed the statement, but added that the Senator from Nevada, Mr. Stewart, had called his attention to the subject on the floor of the Senate. Stewart remarked that he had personally obtained the assent of the majority of the committee to the offering of the amendment. After further discussion, Edwards moved to lay the amendment on the table, which was not agreed to by yeas 19, nays 23.

Washington, 28.—It is generally conceded that Speaker Blaine and the Clerk of the House, Mr. McPherson, will be nominated by the Republican caucus on Tuesday without opposition. Buxton, the present doorkeeper, will be opposed in the caucus by J. W. Corey, who from New York; Postmaster King will be opposed by Col. Jones, of North Carolina, and Sherrod, of Michigan; the Sergeant-at-arms, Ordway, will be opposed by Gen. Herron, of Louisiana, and Col. Stokes, of Tennessee.

Chandler, from the committee on commerce, reported, with amendments, the river and harbor appropriation bill. Sherman called up the House bill to authorize the duplication of registered bonds in certain cases. Passed.

A large number of local bills were passed.

Frankling called up the bill to prevent cruelty to animals, while in transit by railroad or other means of transportation within the United States. It was debated till the expiration of the morning hour, when Conkling tried in vain to get a vote upon the bill. The army appropriation bill was then brought up as unfinished business, when Sawyer moved its postponement, in order to take up the bill relating to the purchase of land, grant, or McGarrahan claim, which was not agreed to, by yeas 11, nays 11.

Notes.

Appropriations.

The Senate bill, authorizing the use of the balance of the appropriation under the control of the library committee, was taken up and passed.

Manager, from the committee on printing, reported a joint resolution for the printing of 25,000 extra copies of the Agricultural report for 1870, omitting the provision for an edition in German, so as not to endanger the passage of the joint resolution.

Maynard asked leave to have the Southern Pacific Railroad bill taken from the Speaker's table and referred to a committee of conference. Objections being made that a motion to suspend the rule cannot be made, except as to appropriation bills, the motion was withdrawn.

Dawes called up his motion to reconsider the vote whereby the committee bill was tabled yesterday, which was agreed to, and the motion to lay it on the table was rejected. Dawes then offered

a substitute, being the same bill, with all the appropriations for new public works, except that for the League Island navy yard, which is omitted. Among other items omitted are the following: For new government buildings at St. Louis, Mo., San Francisco; appraiser's stores at Washington; printing office for the Treasury Department at San Francisco; the hospital on Angel Island, Helena, Montana; and all that were inserted by way of amendments to the bill. It contains the following amendments adopted by the House: Increasing the compensation of Vinie Ream from \$5,000 to \$10,000; increasing the appropriation for the survey of the Western coast from \$200,000 to \$240,000; appropriating \$175,000 for continuing the survey of the northern and north-western lands. It contains, of course, an appropriation for the New York and Boston post-offices. The bill was then proceeded with, and the amendments reported from the committee on appropriations adopted. The only one of importance was one reducing the appropriation for the hire of officers' quarters, of military stores and for repairs of the public buildings of established posts from \$1,000,000 to \$750,000. Among the amendments to the bill, which were laid on the table, was one by Sausbury, prohibiting the use of any of the money appropriated by the bill to pay the expenses of the transportation of any officer or soldier to or from a place of election.

WASHINGTON.

San Domingo—Internal Revenue Officers—Witnesses Summoned—S. P. R. R.

WASHINGTON, 28.—An opinion prevailed among the Senators, that the San Domingo purchase will not be brought up until after the adjournment of Congress, and that an extra executive session of the Senate will be called by the President to set upon the treaty generally. It is agreed that the annexation can be fully completed without the consent of the House, except the voting the purchase money. It does not appear that there has been any change upon the question in either House. The opponents of annexation profess to see no reason for changing their views in view of the information respecting the island, furnished by the newspaper correspondents; while the friends of San Domingo are confirmed in their opinion by the facts thus given. Both parties are already preparing their arguments and the prospects are that the contest over the report of the commissioners will be long and exciting. Prominent Senators who have hitherto exhibited no partisanship on either side, are now endeavoring to get a two-thirds vote to ratify the treaty of annexation, whatever the report of the commissioners may be, and that the Senators who will oppose the treaty have failed to make up their minds already, and will place their opposition on the ground of inexpediency in annexing more contiguous tropical territory.

WASHINGTON, 28.—The commissioner of internal revenue has issued a circular, stating that hereafter he will not assent to the holding, by an internal revenue officer, of any office or appointment, under any State or municipal authority, or any other employment of such officer additional to his official duties; with the exception of acting as store-keeper under direction, under the act of July 20th, 1868.

The Senate investigating committee caused a summons to be sent by telegraph to New York, on Sunday night, to Collector Murphy, directing him to appear before it at Washington last night.

The prospects for the Southern Pacific R.R. bill are not encouraging. The bill, with the request of the Senate for a conference, is upon the Speaker's table, in the House, and cannot be reached without a suspension of the rules. It is doubtful if a two-thirds vote can be obtained for this purpose.

NEW YORK.

Financial—Extensive frauds.

NEW YORK, 28.—There was an important particularly noticeable in the stock market yesterday, where speculation was buoyant. The transactions on 'Change were of immense magnitude, both at the Board and in the Long Room. The financial writer says that the indications are favorable for a prolongation of the present season of activity, as the principal holders of stocks are various cliques, who fortified themselves with large amounts of cash, and are of course able to mark up their specialties at any point they desire. This amounts, however, practically to a simple exchange of shares between various companies, and the result is, therefore, a marked dearth of outside orders.

A Washington dispatch to the Times says, an explosion on Erie railroad matters, such as has never yet occurred, may shortly be looked for. Intelligence has reached the officers of government, to the effect that extensive frauds on the government as well as on the stockholders have been perpetrated by the management, and it is expected the facts will be shortly made public.

FOREIGN NEWS.

CREAT BRITAIN.

London, 28.—Agriculturalism in Ireland has reached a new stage. The Government has decided to attach Confirmation to the price paid to save Belfort.

FRANCE.

When the occupation will cease—The question of the entry in the negotiations—Everything ready for the entry of Paris—Agitation in Paris.

PARIS, 27.—It is stated that the occupation of the departments south of the Seine ceases after the ratification; in the other departments after the payment of five hundred millions. The fortresses will be occupied until the indemnity is paid.

PARIS, 28.—The Paris says the question of entry occupied in the negotiations ten times longer than the cessation of the occupation. Many citizens have purchased a week's provisions to prevent their appearance during the occupation.

A policeman has been murdered because he served under Pétrel.

The consular commission goes to Bordeaux on Tuesday, and the debates commence immediately.

The Parisian army will occupy the left bank of the Seine. None in uniform will be allowed in the portion occupied by the Germans, which will be surrounded by barricades.

On Sunday night there was a patriotic agitation, through a report of the immediate entry of the Germans. The guard rushed from the Champs Elysees to the ramparts to repel the enemy, but there was no disturbance. Paris on Sunday midnight was calm. On Monday morning it was again agitated. Crowds surrounded the placarded notices of Pétrel appealing for order and dignity. The crowd invaded the prison of St. Pelage and freed two commandants of the guards. All the papers, even the ultra radicals, commend non-resistance to the entry of the Germans, and will abstain from publication during the occupation. It is believed no conflict will occur.

VERSAILLES, 28.—Everything is prepared for the entry into Paris. The final orders will be issued tomorrow. Paris was agitated throughout yesterday, but no disorder was manifested. The editors of forty-three newspapers, exhort their readers to calmness and dignity under the trial. The Bourne and theatres will be closed during the occupation. The powder magazine at Villeite has been pillaged by the soldiers.

WEST INDIES.

HAVANA, 27.—Dates from Venezuela to the 9th and 10th of the month. The business was a healthier aspect. The first Fortunate was sold, and it is reported that all the vessels will be sold.
