

CONGRESS WILL BE REPUBLICAN.

Majority Now Thirty-four and
Probably in Next One Will
Be Fifty.

SOUTH IS STILL DEMOCRATIC.

Some Surprising Developments—Re-
ports from Various States Too
Meager to Make Estimates.

Washington, Nov. 8.—President
Roosevelt is assured of the co-opera-
tion of a Republican Congress. The
present Republican majority in that
body is 34, and there need be no sur-
prise if that figure is almost doubled,
and it is reasonably certain to reach a
majority of at least 50. In practically
all districts the Republicans have held
their own, while in some significant
instances the Democrats have lost. Prob-
ably the most marked of these cases are
the Fourth and Fifth districts of Cal-
ifornia (San Francisco), now represented
by Representatives Livermore and
Wynne, Democrats, which reports indi-
cate have been gained by the Republi-
cans. In the Twelfth Ohio district Thom-
as, Republican, is reported to have
defeated Badger, the most surprising
of all the reports, however, comes from
the First and Fifth Missouri districts,
both represented by Mr. Cowherd, chair-
man of the Democratic congressional
committee. The Republicans claim to
have carried both districts. In the light
of these reports a Republican majority
of 50 is considered a conservative esti-
mate.

Returns from the southern states
show that they have returned the
usual Democratic majorities of con-
gressmen as on other candidates.
The result justified the wisdom of
the Republican policy which was to
give special attention in the campaign
to close congressional districts. It is
possible the Republican majority in
the senate will show little if any change
in the present voting strength.
Of the 99 members of that body, 57 are
Republicans and 33 Democrats. The
terms of 30 senators expire on the 4th
of March next. Of these, Dick of Ohio,
Daniel of Virginia and Money of Mis-
sissippi have been elected, and McCo-
mas of Maryland has been succeeded by
Layner of the same state.

This is a Democratic gain, and the
only one made so far. Of those whose
terms expire, seven are Democratic and
two of these already have been chosen
as their own successors. In four of
the other five cases, Ball of Tennessee,
Cochran of Missouri, Culberson of
Texas and Tallaford of Florida, Demo-
cratic successors are assured. The re-
turns are not complete enough to justify
a prediction as to the result on the
legislature in the state but Republicans
count confidently on displacing Mr. Gib-
son with former Senator Carter. The
present terms of 23 Republicans close in
March.

The Reports from Nebraska, Wash-
ington, Utah, Wisconsin, West Virginia
and Nevada are not sufficiently specific
with reference to the complexion of the
various legislatures to make it certain
which party will choose the successors
to Dierks, Foster, Keown, Quarles,
Scott and Stewart. Some of these un-
questionably may, and all probably will
be Republican. The other Republicans
whose terms expire will be succeeded
by Republicans.
