SENATE. WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.-The House bil appropriating \$50,000 for the enforcement of the Chinese exclusion act was reported by Allison and passed. Mitchell then proceeded to address the Senate in advocacy of the bill heretofore introduced by him to reduce letter postage

In the event of the proposed reduction being carried out he thought there was no good reason why the unit of weight should not be fixed at two ounces instead of one not be fixed at two ounces instead of one ounce, and why fourth class matter of merchandise should not be put on an equality with third. With these changes all the present about distinctions between first, third and fourth class matter would be wiped out. A uniform one cant rate for every two ounces would exist on all material except newspapers and periodicals sent to subscribers. The annoyance that so often results from the detention of matter fer insufficient postage would disappear. The temptation to petty fraud by concealment of written matter in matter of a lower grade would vanish and absolute privacy could be given to every parcel of matter mailed, for there would no longer be any reason why it should not all be scaled.

He sent to the clerk's desk and had read the orginal memorandum from which the letter had been written, including the following sentence: "We are entering on a most fearful Presidential contest, the most important since that of 1800; Cleveland by his message, for which I sincerely honor him, has challenged the protected industries of the country to a fight of extermination. The men who are accumulating immense fortunes under the present laws are determined to defeat Cleveland if money and industry will acaccomplish it. It is useless to disguise the fact that the fight is to the death, and we would be idious to ignore that fact. Vest added, that any man who did not appreciate the difference between a letter written under the circumstances under which that letter was written, and one one written to be submitted to the flerce criticism of political opponents, would have no further explanation from him. What he had written, and what 'he letter—fairly construed—did say, was that what is at issue, is the principle of absolute and unlimited protection, which he understood the republican party to favor, and the position of the democratic party, which was raising revenue from taxes properly adjusted; and on that issue the fight was to the death.

That conspiracy against labor had early obtained control of the democratic party. Through the success of that party it hoped for the accomplishment of its purpose, and it is now seemingly awaiting the re-election of Grover Cleveland to carry out its ruinous designs. It was and had always been a sectional conspiracy, and had always been a sectional conspiracy, and its name was Free Trade. Its chief conspirations had always had their home in the south It had started in South Carolina with Cal houn. Its desire had been two-fold; first to extend the southern system where labor should be unpaid and ignorant; and, sec-ond, to circumscribe the northern system, s

system which encouraged intelligence virtue, self-respecting and respected labor. The means by which this was to be accomplished was free trade. What he meant by free trade was not the closing of the custom houses, but what all commercial nations meant by it — a system opposed to prote mean. There was not a leading democrat in the United States in tall communion with his party, enjoying the confidence of the administration, who dared to say that he was a protectionist. Whatever of protection sentiment and courage there had been in any leading democrat had been crushed under the iron heel of the administration. If, by the means which the democrata were now employing, the deception they were now using, and by the imposture by which they are now attempting to secure the votes of the shround no reserve tested, these men would rise in their might once more, put down free trade and demand protection; but it would be a sad experience for them to go through. He mentioned as one of the saddest incidents in American history, the party ostracism of Randall and his defeat for the Speakership because he was a protectionist, and he said that a protectional could no more be elected Speaker of a democratic House of Representatives than he could be transplanted to heaven. It had been necessary to win the President over to the plan of conspiracy. He had been won over, and the bait with which he had been captured was the promise of a renomination, which he had pledged himself not to accept. Randall was a power in the State of Pennsylvania, but Randall has to be stripped of his pewers. It was necessary to degrade him or the free, trade conspiracy could not prevail. The President's next friend, Wm L Scott, had been with the state democratic committee, and he had done this by means which, if his secrets were known, would shock even, the democratic had over the democratic party. Every fellower of Randall in the Housejof Representatives had been jeved to intelligent and democratic Secretary of the Navy because he was a protectionist.

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


