These certificates must be signed by the proper authorities of this city. The Mexican National agent in Laredo reorts that the state health officer here says a quarantine against the City of Mexico has been established by

Ambassador Clayton and Consul-General Barlow know nothing about the state or federal quarantine, conuently much uncertainty exists here sequently much uncertainty exists here whethere or not there is a quarantine against this city. There is no epidemic of typhus fever here, although the death rate has been high, about 100 deaths a day in April.

There were about fifty deaths a day from tunhus fever which was confined to the lower classes.

#### ASPHALT TROUBLE.

#### No Disposition to Dispossess American Concessionaires.

Washington, May 1.-The state department's information regarding the legal proceedings in Venezuela in connection with the asphalt controversy indicates that it will be many months before the issue will come to trial in Venezuelan high court. is no disposition exhibited to dispossess the American concessionaries who are in possession, pending the termination of the legal proceedings, the state department is entirely satisfied with the status quo as to this case. There are, however, other issues which may change the aspect of American affairs in Venezuela.

An attorney named King, representing some of the interests connected with what is known as the Orinoco or Faribault concessions, has laid be-fore the state department complaints of arbitrary actions on the part of the Venezuelan government, and the de-partment has notified Venezuela that it expects just treatment at its hands for American citizens and interests.

The official mail from Venezuela re-

ceived today by Mr. Peuledo, the Venezuelan charge, continues to show a pacific and agreeable tone toward the United States. The Venezuelan au-United States. The Venezuelan au-thorities have taken note of the fact that the unfriendly criticism of Vene-zuela made by some American newspapers, has given way to more tem-perate discussion. On the whole, the official advices show a reassuring state of affairs among those most influential in Venezuelan affairs. The personnel of President Castro's cabinet is made known personally, and the minister of foreign affairs takes occasion, in stating that he will continue his duties, to pay a compliment to the Venezuelan charge at Washington for his conduct of affairs here.

## THE AMERICAN **LECATION GUARD**

Will Not be Subject to Order of Any Foreign General.

TO REMAIN INDEPENDENT.

If Any Power Should Declare War, Might Have to Withdraw Troops from China.

Washington, May 1.-The legation guard at the American legation at Pekin will not be subject to the order of any foreign general. Official reports of the latest phases of the negotiations at Pekin, as told in the press dispatches, have not reached Washing, ton, and it is suggested as a possibility that the demands in this regard of the international generals are unqualified Still, if it is, the American legation guard will retain its independence even if it is necessary to that end to remove it from Pekin and from China, The latter course might become necessary in case one of the powers for-maily declares war upon China and exercises its right to cause the with-drawal of all neutral forces, but under existing conditions the guard will probably remain.

Germany was one of the powers that subscribed heartily to the suggestion of the United States that no nation make private arrangements with China for the enlargement or acquisition of cancessions, so the officials here are sur-prised to learn that the Germans have taken steps to acquire a concession at Canton. It is believed here that it was without doubt the insistence by the United States upon the force of this agreement that checked Russia's tigns upon Manchuria for the time De-

#### "MORMON" CONFERENCE. Most Successful One Ever Held in Germany.

New York, May 1.—A special from Berlin says: The national "Mormon" conference just concluded here was th most successful in the history of Ger Congregations attended from Germany, Italy and Switzerland. Three hundred converts were present from Berlin alone. Many of these are glu-dents of music from Utah and other states. Utah students who embraced "Mormonism" form the nucelus around which Americans studying here gather

Elder James L. McMurrin, memper of the European committee inspecting European congregations, reported agreat increase in converts, many her congregations being formed. Elder Ar-nold Schulthass, leader in Germany, spoke of the great progress of the Church here. Elaborate music was furnished by Utah students, members of the choir of the Berlin "Mormon" con. gregation. Miss Booth, a Utah student, and a new convert spoke in English.

## THE ARMY CANTEEN.

#### Ministers' Committee Runs into a Hornet's Nest in Chicago.

Chicago, May 1.-The committee of clergymen appointed by the Ministers' association of Chicago to investigate the effect of the abolition of the army canteen at Fort Sheridan paid a secret risit to the post today and ran into a hornet's nest. The reports of the people living hear

the post have been to the effect that the number of intoxicated soldiers hear the post has been materially increased since the abolition of the canteen, and the ministers went to the post to investigate for themselves. The members of the committee were: Rev. Parkhurst of anti-saloon fame; Rev. Pr Sain of Oak Park, representing the Congregationalists; Rev. S. E. Dexter, representing the Baptists; Rev. J. S. Hughes, representing the Christian

church.
Col. Van Horne caused a sensation by asking Dr. Parkhurst as to the authority of an alleged interview in which he was made to accuse the army officers of receiving liquors without bills attached. Dr. Parkhurst denied the inerview, but refused to make a written denial for publication.

After several hours of temperance argument the committee withdrew, having accomplished little.

#### MUST ASSESS FRANCHISES, Illinois Judge Issue Mandamus to Equalization Board.

Springfield, Ill., May 1 .- On November 16, 1900, the Chicago Teachers' Federation, through Catherine Goggin and Robert C. Steele, both of Chicago filed a petition in Sangamon circuit court for a peremptory writ of mgh-damus to compel the state board of equalization to assess certain Chicago franchises named in the petition.

Today Judge Ogden P. Thompson of Jacksonville handed down his opinion in the suit and awards a peremptory writ of mandamus. Judge Thompson holds that members of the state board of equalization are public officers, and that it is their legal duty to assess the stocks of the twenty or more companies named in the petition. He says:

"The exigencies of the case demand the application of this extraordinary remedy. Such officers must be made to understand that both the spirit and the letter of the law must be observed; that assessments must be made personally and in absolutely good faith; that he neglect or evasion will be tolerated, and a mandamus is the only remedy known to law by which such duties can be compelled."

#### THE SHIP BUILDING COMBINE Irving Scott Has Received No Notification of it.

San Francisco, May 2.-Irving M. Scott, vice president and general man-ager of the Union Iron works, when asked about the reportd combination of the big shipbuilding plants, said that he had received no notification of any such combination.

"There has been an effort to being about this deal for the past eight months," said Mr. Scott, "but all previ-ous attempts have fallen through. We have not been peddling the Union Iron works about for sale, and when we were approached with a proposition to buy the plant we simply replied that we would sell at any time we got our price for it. We told them what we thought the plant was worth, and rested with that. If the deal has been completed it means that they have accepted our

It will declare that the government has absolutely refused to authorize national loans and will affirm the intention of the treasury to resume gold payments within the period arranged with Great Britain and to provide a reserve of £4, 000,000 to guarantee future years. ## CERMANY MAKES DEMANDS

Wants Five Million Pounds from Great Britain.

ENGLAND DOES NOT COMPLY

Indemnity is Asked on Account of Certain Transvaal Expulsions, Numbering 180.

Berlin, May 1 .- A representative of the government has informed the Reichstag committee on petitions that Germany had demanded £5,000,000 from Great Britain on account of certain Transvaal expulsions, and that Great Britain had refused the demand on the ground that she did not, wish to

indemnified. A part of the remainder have no right to claim indemnity, because they fought against England or because of other patent reasons. The sound claims, however, are being vigor-

ously championed, "Great Britain has appointed a committee to decide upon the claims, fol-lowing Germany's suggestion. It is true there is no German member of the committee, but the services of expert advisory counsel from Germany have been brought into requisition." been brought into requisition.

The reichstag committee acknowledged that the German government had done all that was possible to represent the interests of Germans unjustly expelled.

#### HOT AGAINST MORGAN. Inflammatory Articles Appear in the English Press.

New York, May 2.-There is a good deal of inflammatory rhetoric in a pordeal of inflammatory rhetoric in a por-tion of the English press on the sub-ject of Mr. J. Pierpont Morgan's raids on English shipping, says the London correspondent of the Tribune, but it would be foolish for Americans to de-ceive themselves respecting the real judgment of the shipping interests in England.
