The rapid telegraph system of Pol-ak and Virag, by which a short message was lately transmitted at the rate of \$8,000 words an hour, is thus described: Perforations are made on a strip of tape in two rows, the one above a central unperforated line corres-ponding to the dashes of the Morse alphabet and the row below the center to the dots. As the tape is passed around wheel electrically connected with the elegraph line, a metal brush causes a positive current to pass through the perforations on one side of the line and a like brush transmits a negative current as contact is made with the wheel through the other row of holes. A mirror at the receiving end is swung by an electromagnet to one side by the utive current and to the other side by the negative current.
