## "THE WATER WE DRINK."

Condition of the Supply from Parley's Canyon at the Joint Building.

Engineer Lawrence today cleaned out he screen in the watermain which supplies the city and county building with water, and the collection of trash which had accumulated there was amazing. The screen is composed of three sections through which the water has to pass before it enters the pipes in the building, and it catches nearly all of the debris and prevents it from choking up the pipes throughout the building. The cleaning out today of the screen showed that the water of Parley's creek is in a very bad condition and should be thoroughly filtered before being used in households at all.

It was stated by the engineer today that the screen, which is his own patent, often catches frogs, angle worms, cigar and cigarette stumps which would otherwise circulate through the pipes on the building and cause much annoyance by choking up the pipes. The screen is cleaned out once or twice a week during this season of the year, and was not in as bad condition today as it has been on previous occasions of late. However it is an object lesson to any one who saw it and impresses one with the necessity of filtering the water before using it for any purpose what-
