

## PROMISES OGDEN IMPROVED YARDS

W. H. Bancroft Speaks Authoritatively After Talk With Lovett.

### HIGH HARRIMAN MAN SILENT

Head of Vast Interest Would Only Say He Was Well Pleased With Espee Conditions.

Robert S. Lovett, successor to E. H. Harriman, arrived in Ogden from the west at 10:45 this morning and remained there only 30 minutes. He was accompanied by Julius Krutchnitt, director of operation and maintenance of way, J. C. Stubbs, traffic director, E. O. McCormick, assistant to Mr. Stubbs, E. E. Stromman, of the New York Harriman offices, and W. H. Bancroft, J. M. Davis and others of the O. & N. offices in Salt Lake.

The party visited the shops and made a general inspection of the buildings and improvements now being made around the Ogden depot and grounds. Mr. Lovett was silent when approached by newspaper men except to say that he was well pleased with the conditions he found on the Southern Pacific. After the 30 minute stop in Ogden, the party continued eastward over the Union Pacific.

Before W. H. Bancroft, vice president and general manager of the O. & N. L., left Ogden, he stated that all the improvements planned by the Harriman system in Ogden will be pushed to an early completion.

Among the depot improvements being made are the installing of underground passageways to the various tracks. This improvement, Mr. Bancroft said, was a sure go. About \$200,000 would be spent in the betterment of conditions of the Harriman interests in Ogden.

### OPPOSITION IS AROUSED.

Utah Light & Railway Company to Oppose Saltair Franchise.

The application of the Saltair railway for a city franchise giving it the right of way over the roadbed of the present street railway on North Temple street, has aroused the latter company, whose legal department will appear before the city council in opposition to any such proposition. According to the street railway people, the use by the Saltair company of the former tracks to handle its passenger cars in Main street would deprive the street railway of its entire tourist travel which now goes via the Utah Light & Railway cars to the Saltair depot at Second South and Fourth West streets. Moreover, the joint use of the viaduct would practically ruin it for team travel, and it will be impossible for the Saltair cars to run up town by any other way than by the viaduct.

A plan has been laid before the city council which is being considered, in case it is decided to allow the resort people to lay their tracks as proposed, viz., to have the city double the width of the North Temple street viaduct, locating the four tracks on the one half, and reserving the other half for wagons.

### FOR SELLING PUTRID MEATS.

Proprietors of Success Market Fined \$50 Each by Judge Bowman.

J. Schneider and C. W. Listman, proprietors of the Success Meat market, were fined \$50 each by Judge Bowman in police court, Thursday afternoon, on being found guilty of selling putrid, rotten and unwholesome meat. The testimony developed that they had sold short ribs to Mrs. M. Gaynor, who lives on west North Temple street, Oct. 15, that when the meat was unwrapped, a frightful odor emanated from the package; that the meat was actually so rotten, that it was green in color; that the city meat inspector, Dr. J. W. Treman, after a careful examination,

declared the meat to be in an advanced stage of putrefaction.

Atty. J. E. Darmer, the "American" party political manager, was called into the case ostensibly to represent the defense, but in reality for the purpose of exerting his "pull" on the meat inspector, Walter J. Fowler, however, stood firmly by his subordinate, and when Atty. Darmer, failing to "square" the case out of court, tried to "get funny" with Dr. Treman on the witness stand, he got the worst of it by a long ways. Dr. Treman, it developed, had been a U. S. government inspector, and had had four years' experience in the government service in this line before he began to serve Salt Lake City. Listman and Schneider were granted a stay of execution until Dec. 7, and declared that they intended to appeal the case.

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### ENGINEER HELD UP.

Scott Groesbeck, an engineer who lives at the Touraine hotel, objected to being held up when robbers shoved revolvers into his face as he was walking along a street, between First and Second avenues, Thursday night, and at his first sign of resistance, the hold-ups promptly mauled him over the head with their guns, robbed him of \$40 in

cash and a gold watch, and escaped. The police were notified, but have not captured the holdups.

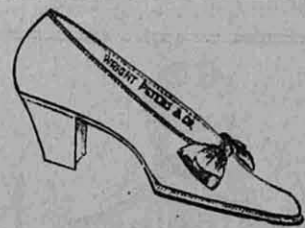
