The party visited the shops and made a general inspection of the buildings and improvements now being made around the Ogden depot and grounds. Mr. Lovett was silent when approached by newspaper men except to say that he was well pleased with the conditions he found on the Southern Pacific. After the 30 minute stop in Ogden, the party continued eastward over the Union Pacific.

Before W. H. Bancroft, vice president and general manager of the O. S. L., left Ogden, he stated that all the improvements planned by the Harriman system in Ogden will be pushed to an early completion.

Among the depot improvements being made are the installing of underground passugeways to the various tracks. This improvement, Mr. Bancroft said, was a sure go. About \$2,000,000 would be spent in the betterment of conditions of the Harriman interests in Ogden.

OPPOSITION IS AROUSED. Utah Light & Railway Company to Oppose Saltair Franchise.

The application of the Saltair railway for a city franchise giving it the right of way over the roadbed of the present street railway on North Temple street, has aroused the latter company, whose legal department will appear before the city council in opposition to any such proposition, According to the street railway people, the use by the Saltair company of the former's tracks to handle its passengers in Main street would deprive the street railway of its entire tourist travel which now goes via the Utah Light & Railway cars to the Saltair depot at Second South and Fourth West streets, Moreover, the joint use of the vladuct would practically ruin it for team travel, and it will be impossible for the Saltair cars to run up town by any other way than by the vladuct.

A plan has been laid before the committee of the city council which is being considered, in case it is decided to allow the resort people to lay their tracks as proposed, viz., to have the city double the width of the North Temple street viaduct, locating the four tracks on the one half, and reserving the other half for wagons

Oregon Short Line officials claim the change of name of "Overland Limited" to another designation has been properly called for by the exigencies of railway travel. There are now three west-bound Overland Limited trains over the Union Pacific road, the limited for San Francisco, the limited for Los Angeles, and the limited for Portland. It has been found necessary to distinguish these three trains by some special title, so for the present each train is given the name of the terminal for which it is destined, such as the Portland limited, San Francisco limited and the Los Angeles limited. GIANT LOCOMOTIVES.

Three Monster Compounds Turned

Three Monster Compounds Turned Out for Southern Pacific.

Three glant Mallet articulated compound locomotives have just been built for the Southern Pacific road by the Baldwin Locomotive works at Philadelphia. They are compounds, with two sets of running gear, so that the combination is really two engines with the one boller, with the high pressure on the rear driving gear, and the low pressure on the forward gear. The cylinders are 26 and 38 by 34 Inch valve, balanced piston; boiler, 84 inches in diameter, % and 15-16 Inchestel, with working pressure of 220 pounds, firebox, 72x79x129% inches, fire tubes, 357x21%; feedwater heater tubes 417; heating surface, 6.621 square feet; driving wheels, 63 inches, wheel base, engine 59 feet, 10 inches; total engine and tender, 98 feet 5½ inches; tender 12: 344 inch wheels, 12000 evillors and tender, 98 feet 51% inches; tender 12; 341% inch wheels, 12,000 gallons water. 4,000 gallons oil; weight, on driving wheels, 412,350 pounds; total engine 462,450 pounds; total engine and tender, 700,000 pounds, or 350 tons. The cost of each machine is \$30,000.

HAWLEY IS REACHING OUT.

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St. Louis, Dec. 2—A widespread shifting of railroad officials and the removal of the headquarters of the Chicago & Eastern Illinois railroad from Chicago to St. Louis are to result from the Rock: Island-Frisco deal, consummated in New York yesterday. According to information here, H. I. Miller, now president of the Chicago & Eastern Illinois, will have a position with the Rock Island.

Official anouncement is also expected soon of the joining of the St. Louis Brownsville & Mexico to the Frisco system. The consummation of this plan depends, it is said, upon the ability of the Frisco to obtain trackage rights from its main line to the Brownsville road and to the Colorado Southern and the New Orleans & Pacific.

If this is done, through routes will have been established from Chicago, St. Louis and Kansas City to New Orleans, principal cities of Texas and the Mexican border at Brownsville.

The Brownsville road, in conjunction with the National Railways of Mexico, is bridging the Rio Grande from Brownsville to Matamoras, Old Mexico, An extension from the latter place to Tampico is also contemplated and there connections will be made with a new line to Mexico City. This, when completed, will reduce the mileage between St. Louis and the City of Mexico, 200 miles.
