THE CONGREGATIONAL OREED.

An attempt has been made by number of Congregational minis ters to effect the formulation of written creed, subscription which shall be necessary to acknowledged membership in the body of Congregationalism. The evident intention of the movement was the exclusion of some churches and preachers from fellowship, now sailing underCongregational colors. But the doctrines and principles of those who claim to belong to this denomination are rather difficult of arrangement. Indeed, they are impossible of crystalization into a creed, because many of them are discordant and unblendable. The genius of Congregational church government is almost inconsistent with the formation of a set form of faith. It gives the utmost latitude to each local body of worshippers. So far is this extended that in some good. parts of the world Congregationalists are popularly known as "Inde--pendents."

But the need of a creed for the times is called for by the changes that have taken place in the views of both preachers and, people, since the promulgation of the dogmas laid down in the Westminster catechism, and the rejection by most of them of the extreme views euunclated by Calrin and his discipler. try.
