Mr. Mons Peterson was present and represented the state board f horticulture, urging the appointment of a county board and a fruit tree intor, that a systematic effort might e made to war against insect pests and Beases which menace the fruit interests of the county. Chairman Joseph tanford of the county board and Atty. T. Hulaniski were present and took uch interest in the discussion. The sed of a tree inspector and county oard was generalaly conceded, as pear light, San Jose scale and other pests ere making headway in the county.
