Gov. Higgins' view of the proposed law is interesting. "From a moral viewpoint it is impossible for me to understand," said the governor recently, "how the act of a man on one side of a fence inclosing a betting ring can be legal, when on the other side of the fence it is a crime.

The bill proposed makes it a crime on both sides of the fence." A movement is being organized throughout the state in support of the

measure. The National Reform Bureau, the New York Association for the Suppression of Vice, the Christian Endeavorers and the Ministerial associations are promoting it.

The proposed law is farreaching in its effects. It has been estimated that \$4,000,000 are won and lost in New York State race tracks each year, The estimated total value of the eight larger race tracks in the state is \$7,-100,000, or nearly as much as all the other running tracks in the United States.

Peter De Lacy, who has been a consistent enemy of the Jockey Club, denies sponsorship of the Lansing bill but it is generally believed that its introduction is the culmination of his long fight against the organized racing interests in the East.
