COLORADO RIVER SURVEY.

Attention Being Paid to Region Near Needles, Cal., by Government.

What is to be known as the Needles quadrangle is now under survey by the United States geological survey, and topographic maps of the region will soon be prepared. This area lies in eastern San Bernardino county, California, and southwastern Mahar California, and southwestern Mohav county, Arizona, and touches the Nevada state line on the north. The Th Colorado river cuts through the district from northwest to southeast, dividing it into two nearly equal parts. At the eastern end of the basin included in the quadrangle the parts. greatest depression is the Sacramento Wash, the course of which is due west and is followed by the line of the Santa Fe railroad. The region is bare and forbidding, but the soil is said to respond with wonderful fertility to irrigation. A few small scattered "prospect holes" are to be found in the foothils, but the

Santa Fe railroad is the only perma-nent improvement of any kind. The mountains, the foothills, and the sides of the basin have been mapped on a scale suitable for showing their mineral features, but the river bottom

has been mapped on a larger scale, in connection with the reclamation surveys. Work of a similar character is also being undertaken along the Colorado river in the vicinity of Yuma, Arizona.
