SAN ANTONIO, Tex., 24.—Telegraphic reports from the Lower Rio Grande Ind. say that about 20 persons were killed by the recent Indian raids. Nine persons are known to have been killed by the Indians in the northwestern border, between Fort Concho and Stockton.

Russian Engineers Officers.

LONDON, 24.—The Standard announces that twelve Russian engineer officers, who were recently at Rome, have started for the Suez Canal and Persian Gulf.

The Events on the Bosphorus.

A Vienna correspondent hears that Russia, fearing that the Turks will permit the English to occupy the forts on the Bosphorus, in the event of war, has asked Germany to guarantee a line of demarcation during the negotiations. Prince Blaurock is considering this request.

Attempt to Destroy a Powder Factory.

A letter from Bucharest reports that Russians have unsuccessfully attempted to destroy a powder factory at Bucharest. Two persons were killed.

No Confidence in the Negotiations.

A St. Petersburg correspondent telegraphs: "The report that Blaurock intends to abandon all further attempts at conciliation is not believed in well-informed circles, but little confidence is placed in the ultimate success of the negotiations."
