Auditor Heginbotham Enumerates

Reasons for This-Gratifying Financial Condition.

County Auditor Frank Heginbotham submitted his annual report, to the county commissioners yesterday, setting forth in detail the financial condition of the city at the close of last year. The expenditurese for the year were in excess of the record for 1906 and the county auditor makes a statement regarding the reasons for the greater amounts expended in the county. The amounts expended in the county's assets are \$\$27,259.09 and its inabilities \$29,274.27 less than this amount. The receipts for the year amounted to \$420,964.70. The appropria-tions reached \$415,807.20. At the begin-ning of last year there was \$120,142.83 on hand in the various funds and the be-ginning of this year saw a balance on hand amounting to \$121,444.82. Regarding the increased expenditures for the year, the auditor says: Legislature of 1907 imposed additional duties and expense of \$577.50 on the clerk's office, account juvenile court. License collector was added to the sheriff's office in 1907 at a cost of \$875; also, an additional jailer was employed at the county jail at a cost of \$800, and an additional expense of \$331.70 for ex-tra deputy at Bingham during the ill-ness of Deputy Forbes, who was acci-dentally shot, making a total extra ex-pense of \$62,006.70 for 1907. A complete new laundry plant was in-stalled at the county infirmary during the year, at a cost of \$1.248.51, which amount is included in the infirmary expense of 1907. Included in election expense for 1907 is the second payment on voting ma-chines, amounting to \$3,750 and \$756 interest on deforred payments, making a total of \$4,536. Of the amount charged to building and grounds, \$975 was for the county's portion of the cost of the building erect-ed for storing voting machines.
