HILLSDALE, Iron County, March 27th, 1872.

Editor Deseret News:

Dear Sir—I am forming a new settlement in Iron county, seven or eight miles above Pangwich, on the Savie river, which I call Hillsdale. There are many facilities here for a good settlement, such as plenty of timber for sawing, fencing, and firewood near at hand, plenty of farming and meadow land, with an almost endless stock range, abundance of water easy of access for irrigation, trout and other fish in the river easy to be caught. Bro. George D. Willson and myself have a large upright saw mill almost ready to run, and have a good turbine water wheel and three foot circular saw, which we shall soon put to sawing boards, with two small circulars for sawing lath. Any good men and women who wish to assist in forming a new settlement are respectfully invited to come and look at this location, which is on the main road from Pangwich to Johnson and Kanab.


