HENDERSON DEFINES HIS POSITION. Henderson rose to a question of privi-Henderson rose to a question of privi-lege. He said he had been requested to attend before the Board of Impeach-ment Managers, to testify in regard to the subject of their investigation. He read his answer declining to comply read his answer declining to comply with their request, because their action was calculated to deprive the Senate of proper control over its own affairs. He now submitted the question to the Sen-

Pomeroy said he had received a simi-lar notice and had testified, not suppos-ing that he had thereby compromised the dignity of the Senate. Summer followed in the same strain. He said it was possible that another article might be filed on evidence now being taken.

## DAVIS' RESOLUTION.

The resolution offered by Davis was then taken up. It refers to the action taken by certain parties, which reflects on the integrity of the members of the Senate. The resolution calls for the appointment of a committee to investigate the whole matter. A lopg discussion ensued, pending which, the Senate went into executive session and soon after adjourned.

## HENDERSON EXAMINED.

Washington. - Senator Henderson was examined by the Impeachment Managers, yesterday. He said that the Missouri delegation called on him and urged impeachment from a party point of view. He informed them that his duties were judicial, not political. Some feeling arose when, under the excitement of the moment, Henderson said he would reaign his seat, but after re-flection he concluded that this course would be wholly inadmissible, and he so informed the members of the delegation. He said he did not believe the members intended to corruptly influence his vote, but he thought they had taken a false and erroneous view of the subject, and were at first disposed to pursue it with too much zeal. He was asked about dining with the Chief Justice. He said he was only one of fourteen Senators who really dined with him on the occasion mentioned. He had no communication with the Chief Justice with reference to the reported new party, neither had the Chief Justice relation to the Cabinet changes.
