

ADVISORY BOARDS ARE RECOGNIZED

Forty-six Associations of Western Stockmen Co-operate With Forest Service.

SEVENTEEN IN LAST YEAR.

Information of Valuable Character Distributed Among Members—Conditions Governing Recognition.

(Special Correspondence.)

Washington, Nov. 4.—During the past year 17 associations of western stockmen have applied to the forest service for the recognition of their advisory boards, swelling the total number of associations thus recognized to 46. The recognition accorded entitles an association to receive notice of proposed action, and an opportunity to be heard by the local forest officer in reference to increase or decrease in the number of stock in the division of the range between adjacent classes of stock and their owners, and in the adoption of special rules to regulate the use of the range, and in every other recommendation of the advisory board, as far as the rights of non-members, and the other interests involved, will allow.

VALUABLE CO-OPERATION.

The co-operation is of value both to the stockmen interested and to the government. The stockman is afforded an opportunity to work out his own difficulties. The government has the benefit of the training and experience in meeting the complicated situations which arise in connection with its administration of the national forest land. By this means the division of the range between cattle and sheep is conducted amicably, bringing about an absence of ill feeling and bitterness. The necessary

many reductions to provide for new owners or prevent damage to the range are distributed to the best advantage and in the way which will cause the least inconvenience or loss to the owner affected. Seasons are established which will secure a maximum of use of the range with a minimum of damage, and questioned fees are promptly adjusted, while conflicting claims to ranges and resultant disputes are settled within the association more often than by appeal to the government officers. Wherever an association is organized local administration follows.

RECOGNITION GRANTED.

It is the policy of the forest service to make every national forest as self-administrative as conditions will permit, and it has welcomed the hearty co-operation of the stockmen. Formal recognition will be granted an association whenever its membership constitutes a majority of the users of the forest or division for which it seeks recognition, and every facility will be afforded the members to maintain the organization as a co-operative unit of the national administration.

ADMINISTRATION OF CHARITIES IMPROVED

Chicago, Nov. 9.—Administration of charities in Chicago has greatly improved in the last 20 years, according to Miss Jane Addams in an address here last night.

Miss Addams' declaration was given added weight from the fact that she recently was elected president of the National Conference of Charities and Corrections, being the first woman so honored.

"Charity is more kindly and more efficiently dispensed in Chicago now than it was 20 years ago," said Miss Addams. "There is also a growing tendency to go beyond the mere relief of individual cases, and to seek out the causes to apply prevention as well as cure."

GEOMETRY TO BE REFORMED.

Chicago, Nov. 9.—Geometry, the stumbling block of so many high school students, is to be reformed, though Euclid said there was "no royal road" to it. A national committee of 15 professors, seven from universities and eight from high schools, will undertake to make the study "more practicable." Prof. Herbert E. Slaught, of the University of Chicago, is chairman.

A CHAUFFEUR'S SENTENCE.

Given Ten Years for Killing a Man, But Let Out on Probation.

Sacramento, Cal., Nov. 9.—Judge Hughes yesterday imposed a sentence of 10 years in the penitentiary at Folsom upon Claude Wood, convicted of manslaughter for running over and killing James P. Smith on the Riverside road last August, and at the same time ordered that the commitment be withheld and the defendant placed on probation. In the terms of the probation is included a provision compelling Wood to contribute \$25 a month toward the support of the five children he made fatherless by his reckless driving.

Wood has other provisions he must live up to, and whenever he violates the terms of the probation Judge Hughes will have the commitment placed in the hands of the sheriff, with direction that the young chauffeur be taken to the penitentiary.

New York, Nov. 9.—The Lotus club sold for \$750,000 the property on Fifth avenue for which it paid \$250,000 16 years ago and it will make its new home on a side street.

INHERITED \$4,000,000.

New York, Nov. 9.—Hunt Tilford Dickson, a 10 months old motherless boy, now with his father on a Georgia plantation, has inherited \$4,000,000 from the estate of his grand uncle, Wesley Hunt Tilford, a former vice-president of the Standard Oil company, who died last March leaving an estate worth more than \$11,000,000.

The will gives \$7,000,000 outright to Henry M. Tilford, his brother, and the balance is divided among other relatives.
