Slide valves may be used to fill railroad or other tanks when a waste is not wanted, and where the pipes are thoroughly protected from frost; also for hose connections, or where a separate waste is used. SEC. 5.-No telegraph pole, hitching or other post shall be set nearer than six feet to any gas main orservice pipe, nor shall any water service be laid within six feet of any gas service; and no gas or water service trench in any street, alley or sidewalk shall be left open during the night. SEC. 6.-Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or of the ordinances, rules and regulations relating to the introduction, supply and consump-tion of water from the Salt Lake City Water Works, shall, upon conviction, pay a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars for each offance; and If the offender be a licensed plumber he shall, in addi-tion to such fine, forfeit his liceuse which shall not bel renewed for a term of thirty days.
