in Washington of Senor Galvan, minister of finance of the defunct Wos y Gil administration of San Domingo, has led to a revival of the report that the in the assertion of supremacy of its instatement with the assistance of the United States, undertaking in return to allow the United States to assume a ull protectorate over the island of San Jomingo,

It may be stated, however, that the the department entertains absolutely no thought of establishing a protector-rate over San Domingo or of annexing it. It is declared positively that Amer-lean interference in the island's affairs will be Bruted in the will be limited to the protection of American interests there, that the existing engagement as to arbitrations and concessions to Americans is observed, and that American trade is not mproperly obstructed. It is learned from trustworthy

sources that Wos y Gil, the deposed president, is now on his way to the United States and expected to land at New Orleans today or tomorrow. He will come to Washington. Advices reached Washington that

there are now three revolutions in San Domingo, the revolution led by Morales, a revolution at Monte Christi, led by the followers of Jiminez, and a third and stronger service is the service of the ser and stronger revolution in the south of the island. It appears that Morales has secured control by an appeal to the Dominicans that the United States in-tended to annex the island. It is also said that Morales has received many courtesies from European representa-

He has drawn up a bill, copies of which have heen sent leading business. have been sent leading business men, manufacturers and labor leaders, with a request that they suggest such amendments as they deem necessary to make the bill, it enacted into law, as effective as possible. The bill provides for a commission of

The bill provides for a commission of six members at a salary of \$8,600 a year with the secretary of commerce and labor as an ex-officio member and chairman. The members are not to accept perequisites aside from their sal-aries under a penalty of a fine of \$5 000. or two years'imprisonment or both. The headquarters of the tribunal are to be in Washington.

The proposed bill provides that the tribunal determine all cases, either in the affirmative or negative, on the the animative or negative, on the claims of both parties. It also provides that there shall be no strike or lockout pending the investigation, and both parties to the controversy are to re-sume and continue their former rela-tions. This condition is to remain until a decision has been rendered a decision has been rendered.

Child Burned to Death.

Whatcom, Wash., Dec 4 .-- The de Whatcom, Wash., Dec 4.—The de-struction of the home of George Wright by fire this morning caused the death of one child and the perhaps fatal in-jury of another. Early morning fires were started in the lower part of the house by one of the sons. The heat generated in one of the stoves became so intense as to set fire to the wall pa-per and in a few minutes the flames so intense as to set fire to the wall pa-per and in a few minutes the flames spread to the upper portion of the house where the family was sleeping. Reuben, aged 6, was burned to death. In trying to save his life, his sister Maggie, aged 17, nearly lost her own, being compelled finally to jump from an upstairs window after her hair had been burned from her scalp and her face and arms terribly scorched. In jumping, her back was injured and the physicians are unable to tell whether physicians are unable to tell whether or not she will recover.

or not she will recover. There were 12 children in the family of George Wright, all sleeping upstairs. Reuben, who lost his life, was sleeping in a room directly at the top of the stairway, up which the flames rushed, cutting off all the avenue of escape. The nother, with the two youngest in her arms, escaped by jumping from the roof of the kitchen at the back of the roof of the kitchen at the back of the house. Maggie, who was so terribly hurt, tossed another of the younger children from the upstairs window and in trying to save her brother Reuben. who was suffocated and burned to death, came near losing her own life All the children were compelled to jump from the upstairs windows to save their lives, but none sustained injuries of a serious nature, though all had then aces blistered and their hair burned by the flames.
