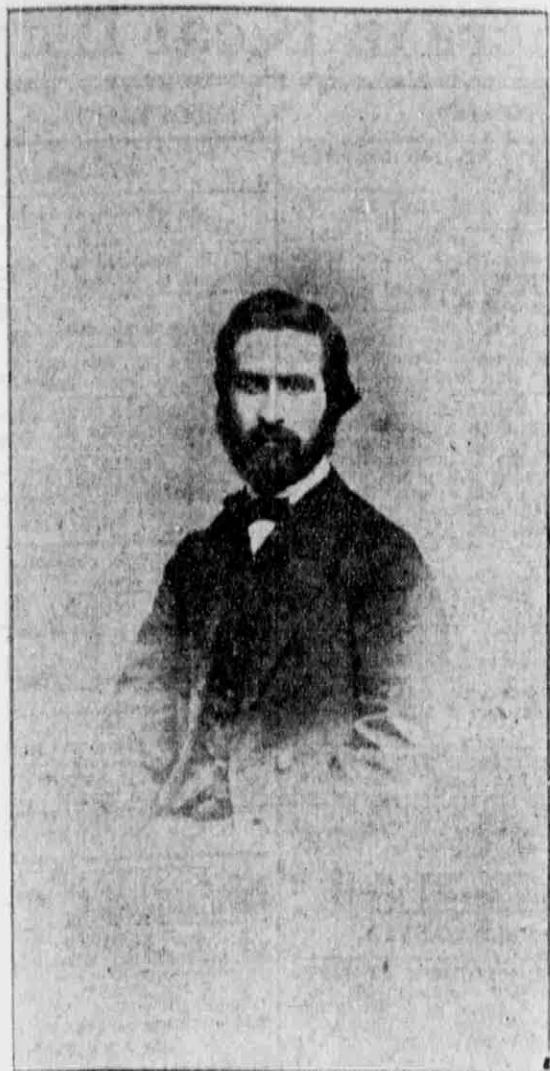


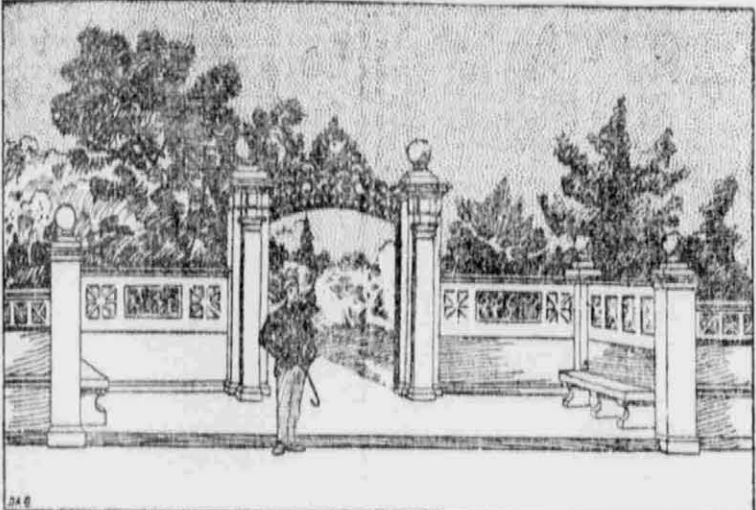

MEMORIAL GATE AT CAMBRIDGE.



The handsome gate shown in the cut is one that the Daughters of the American Revolution have volunteered to erect as a memorial to commemorate Washington assuming command of the Continental army. It is designed to be a gift to the city of Cambridge, Mass., and if accepted by the municipal authorities will be built on Cambridge common, near the famous Washington elm. It will be wrought from supported on each side by carved granite pillars. The central pillars will bear two bronze tablets, one showing a medallion of Washington and the other bearing a suitable inscription.

BARRY WAR COLLEGE HEAD.

The announcement that Brig.-Gen. Thomas H. Barry has been selected for president of the war college at Washington has caused a great deal of excitement in military circles. This appointment was kept secret for a long time and the military men of the country have been very anxious to hear who the honored man was to be. Gen. Barry is now in Manchuria with the Russian army, but he is expected to return very soon to take up his new position.



TRUXTON, AGENT FOR GOVERNMENT.

The arrival of Scott Truxton, appointed by Gov. Winthrop as special commercial agent of Porto Rico is the first step toward making Porto Rico one of the greatest coffee-producing countries of the world, and creating a market in the United States for the entire output of the island. The principal purpose of the new agency, is to call attention of American capital to the thousands of acres of magnificent coffee land as yet uncultivated and unplanted in the island hills, and also to the other thousands of acres already planted, but which are held back by lack of proper cultivation.

LEWIS AND CLARK NEWS.

Fifty Igorrotes of the head-hunting tribe will reach Portland, Oregon, about the 1st of August, when they will build a village of their native huts and become a feature of the Lewis and Clark exposition. They come by consent of the United States government.

Somebody has unearthed from the files of the Scientific American this little item of present interest, which was printed in the issue of Sept. 2, 1867. It cutting some timber in Omaha, a few days since, a bullet was found imbedded in the trunk of a rock elm. The grains which had overgrown it show that it must have been deposited there thirty-two years ago, a time when the country had not yet been visited by any white men, except the explorers Lewis and Clark.

The skull and horns of a Rocky Mountain sheep were found some time ago by an Idaho man, deeply imbedded 20 feet from the ground in the trunk of a large tree. The section containing the curiosity has been taken to the Lewis and Clark exposition, where it is attracting much attention. It is presumed that, when the tree was a sapling, the sheep got entangled in its branches, and died. As the sapling grew into a tree, the sheep were lifted heavenward, and its skull and horns became imbedded in the trunk.

Heliograph signals are now being flashed from the snow-dome of Mt. Hood to a station near the government buildings on the Lewis and Clark exposition grounds, seventy miles distant. Mt. Hood appears to be but three or four miles away. A squad of United States troops, in command of a lieutenant, has established a signal station near the summit of the grand old peak, and the exposition is in daily communication with the mountain. Several parties of adventurous people will climb to the summit of Mt. Hood during the summer, as a sort of side trip from Portland, the exposition city.

YALE NOT FOR BEER.

The Bible has a great deal to say to and about young men. There are 62 places where the words "young men" occur, and in these places (in the cores of volumes of sermons and talks and warnings and encouragements to the sons of the world—whose staid young shoulders are making ready to bear the burden of the nation, Paul told Titus to exhort the young men to be "sober-minded," discreet, and John wrote to the young men who had overcome "the wicked one." They were worth writing to because they were "strong" and the word of God did abide in them. The young men count! And because they count, the recent action of Yale's young men in voting down gambrinus will win the applause, not only of the temperance people, but of thousands who have not yet themselves come out publicly on the side of total abstinence.

The Yale winter class book reveals the vote of the classes two to one for water instead of beer. Champagne and whisky are said to have received but a scant vote, and out of the whole class only 175 admit drinking intoxicants. Good for the young men! But better things than this are in store, and we are watching for the high grade college that will, through its whole membership, forever put the ban upon the use of alcoholic beverages.

Writing in 1858, in his essay entitled "Will the Coming Man Drink Wine?" James Parton, the famous historian, said: "I can now say to young fellows who order a bottle of wine and flatter themselves that in so doing they are proving themselves 'jolly dogs.' No, my boys, it is because you are dull dogs and that you want wine. You are forced to borrow excitement because you have squandered your natural gaiety. The ordering of wine is a confession of inferiority. When we feel it necessary to 'take something' at certain times during the day, we are in the same condition as that of a merchant who every day, about the anxious hour of half-past two, has to run around among his neighbors borrowing credit."

SOBRIETY THE ELEMENT OF SUCCESS.

The Chicago Inter-Ocean has been doing editorial honor to one of the city's retired blue-coats, Patriman James Kervin. The editorial referred to points out the fact that Patriman Kervin has retired well-to-do, and seeks out the reason for this since the men who take care of the city and its citizens are not supposed to receive such remuneration as shall make them remarkably well off in the things of this life. It is suggested by the Inter-Ocean that "some superficial cynics" will declare that by graft and craft this man, said to be worth \$150,000, with a home in a part of Wabash avenue where "property is not cheap" to speak very mildly—is the means by which James Kervin has come into his prosperity. "Pull" is another word imputed to these critics. So the great daily sent a reporter to see what the retired patrolman had to say about it. He gave these "maxims" as the principal foundation stones on which his material prosperity has rested itself: "Leave liquor alone and keep a clear head when trouble comes."

No excuse for a policeman being "called on the carpet" if he holds his temper in check and keeps his duty in mind.

Don't dissolve your money in liquor. Invest it in something tangible that will bring returns. Save something when you are young—no matter how small the salary—and you will have no want to fear when the sunset comes on. It has not been many years when even a strong city daily would have refrained from giving editorial emphasis to such maxims as the above. These things are as the income dove, bearing to Noah the olive-leaf of hope. The waters of destruction are abating. Some glad day the temperance hosts will step out on to the promised dry land—the land cleansed of the curse of alcohol and all its unholy brood.
