Telephone Companies Had Busy and Strenuous Time.	
Telephone Companies Had a strenuous time of it last night, in answering calls from every quarter as to how the election was going. The Bell company management had eleven information operators on duty, as well as a staff of operators at the headquarters of the different parties to collect information as fast as possible and forward the same to the central station for dissemination to anxious inquirers. The company answered 6,500 local and 1,000 long distance election calls. Over the hours of 8 and 11 p. m., not a few of the calls coming in from Idaho and northern Utah. The independent company also had a full force of operators on duty and answered calls as fast as they came in. The employees were treated to a fine supper in the building early in the evening.	
TO FORM NEW COMPANY.	
This is Desire of Colonel Land of First Infantry.	
Col. Land of the First Infantry is anxious to organize a new company for the regiment in this city, and steps will shortly be taken with this end in view. The letter "G" is a vacant number in the company nomenclature, and the new company is expected to be given that letter. It formerly belonged to the Provo company, now defunct, and has been held for a hoped-for resurrection of that company. But this hope has lost its grip, and the letter will be given to the next company to be organized. The regiment has now companies A, B, C, D, E, F and H. There is a steady move in the state to increase the eight and ten-company regiments to the full twelve-company complement, thus giving each regiment three battalions of four companies each, and three majors. New York has a full regiment of engineers, a full regiment of coast artillery and a regiment of cavalry. Illinois and Ohio also have each a full regiment of cavalry.

DECENCY WINS IN NEW YORK STATE.

Chas. E. Hughes Defeats W. R. Hearst by About 60,000 Plurality.

home city, however, that he encountered the bitterest and most determined opposition. Kings county, of which Patrick McCarran is the Democratic leader, last year gave Hearst for mayor a large plurality, but yesterday McCarran exerted all his forces to return a Hughes plurality in his county. His efforts were crowned with success, as the Hearst and to vote the remainder of the Democratic ticket.

While Hearst succeeded in carrying the county by a plurality of 4,500, the returns for the remainder of the state ticket show that his trouble with McCarran cost him dearly. The plurality of the county for the Democratic candidates who were not affected by McCarran's order, exceeded that of the head of the ticket by more than 50,000. Had Hearst received those votes it would have cut Hughes' lead in the state practically in half.
